Up to the spring of 2023 Parkwood Church Annual Reports were available in pdf format from 2001 the most current (2022), and in paper format only from 2000 back to 1965. That spring a project to create pdf versions of the reports for the period 2000 back was undertaken as a grade 12 volunteer project by Cheyenne Copeland under the supervision of her grandfather, Gord Walford. Some of the reports had personal notes written by the owner (mainly Gord Walford and Evelyn Warburton); some of these have been removed, some retained. All years's reports have been "bookmarked". Some reports from 2001 on list errors (errata); in some years those errors have been corrected. In earlier years it was the practice of the clerk of session to issue a copy of the minutes of a given Annual Congregational Meeting shortly after the meeting took place; where this occurred those minutes are appended to the Annual Report for that year, and bookmarked accordingly. For ease of access, Annual Reports have been grouped by decade.

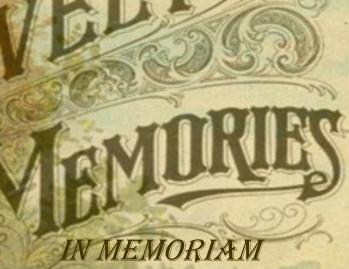

A Word from the Minister

The annual report for the church is always prepared in advance of the annual congregational meeting. "Meeting" this year has taken on a different meaning!

Having read from start to finish the final draft of the report which is now either in your hands or on your screen, I am conscious that we have carried on with the work and witness of the church throughout the past year, in spite of having fewer and different meetings.

After 11 months of online "meetings" we have a different perspective on — and perhaps a different appreciation of the value of — "meetings".

People miss seeing each other in person. Those living alone, especially, miss physical contact. Human touch — a handshake, or a warm hug — are important ways that we communicate our care for one another. Extended families very much miss seeing each other — and the church, in Christ, is one extended family.

Sharing food and drink is also part of our life together. Many of us, for many years, have shared a fellowship pot-luck supper together prior to our annual congregational meeting. We have looked forward to informal conversation and individual affirmation. We eat, and reflect together on the past year, and we aim to spur one another on to love and good deeds going forward.

I was reminded in my daily Bible reading this morning of two things, both of which are perhaps appropriate as we continue to face life and its challenges in the midst of a global pandemic. Paul writes: "If we live, we live to the Lord; and if we die, we die to the Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord." He goes on in the same chapter to say, "For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness, peace and joy in the Hoy Spirit, because anyone who serves Christ ... is pleasing to God." (Romans 14: 8, 17-18, NIV)

We need the assurance that in the real and difficult environment in which all people around the world are facing a common challenge — a serious threat to health and thus life — disciples of Jesus Christ have a healthy and life-giving perspective. Whether in life or in death, we belong to God, and are united to Jesus by the Holy Spirit. We need not fear the present nor the future.

We are also called and invited to recognize that present restrictions on gathering, and eating and drinking together, are temporary. Physical separation does not change the reality of our spiritual union. We are **one in Christ. Our "righteousness, peace and joy" are in the Holy Spirit and are no less real and present** when we are serving Christ in our individual daily lives as when we are eating and drinking together.

Let us give thanks for the presence of Christ and the work inspired and enabled by the Holy Spirit in our lives, and for the continued life and witness of the Church as the family of God, pointing others to Christ even and especially when we continue to be — for a short time — physically apart.

In accordance with the team's mandate as set out in section 170 of the Book of Forms, the team conducted an independent scrutiny of the records of Parkwood Church to ensure that receipts received and disbursements made are accurately recorded and documented.

The team's work began in late November 2019 and was completed in February 2020. The findings of the audit team, based on the work performed, are that the books and records of Parkwood Presbyterian Church for 2019 appear to be in order.

The detailed finding of the audit team will be presented to the Treasurer and the leader of the Finance Team.

The "review" of the Planned Giving/Endowment Fund will take place subsequent to the date of the Annual meeting by a person(s) appointed by the Session to do so.

D. Representative Elder Report

The Presbytery of Ottawa consists of twenty churches and one extension work, the Barrhaven Mission, as well as an Arabic ministry which began in 2015 as an initiative of Grace Church, Orleans. The Presbytery in partnership with the Presbytery of Seaway-Glengarry employs a part-time Ministry Animator, Cheryl Gaver. The presbytery also oversees the operation of Gracefield camp through a Board of Directors. During 2020 the presbytery saw no departures, one retirement, and three inductions: Jonathan Dent to Grace Orleans in January, Chris Clarke to Westminster in February and Paul Wu to St. Giles in December; one minister continues as stated supply: Ruth Draffin at Rockland Community Church. Two churches are vacant: St. Andrew's Aylmer (operating under a long-term supply arrangement) and Trinity Carp. which became vacant at the end of the year. The presbytery met twelve times in 2020, six "regular meetings", three induction services, and three special meetings: one on a pastoral relations matter, one on 2019 remits related to human sexuality and theology and one mainly to do with Gracefield Camp.

I serve Synod as the convener of the Finance Committee and as such am a member of Synod Council. The Synod consists of five Presbyteries: Quebec, Montreal, Seaway-Glengarry, Ottawa and Lanark-Renfrew. Synod Council met twice in 2019, in May and September. Synod Council has assumed duties previously undertaken by various Synod committees. James also sits on Synod Council, as clerk of our presbytery. Synod decided in 2018 to meet every 2 years; it did not meet in 2019; it met online via Zoom in October 2020. A full "in-person" synod is planned for 2021 in Cornwall, including a conference on the theme "Climate Control: What Can I Do?"

Our minister is the Presbyt@yerk; the Moderator is Debi Brown, representative elder from St. Andrew's church, Aylmer. A number of Parkwood people sit on Presbytery committees.

It has been an honour and a privilege to represent Parkwood at Presbytery and Synod this past year. The Presbyterian Church in Canada continues to face considerable challenges, especially navigating through the issue of human sexuality. Much prayer is needed for the presbyteries and General Assembly in 2021 as major decisions are contemplated. The future unity and witness of the Presbyterian Church in Canada as we know it may be significantly **affected** by these decisions. At the time of writing this report the 2021 General Assembly is set to meet online and there is considerable concern over the ability to make wise and considered decisions in such a milieu.

I. Planned Giving Ministry

In 2020, donations to the Planned Giving Fund were \$5,000. This amount was transferred to the separate bank account for the Planned Giving Ministry (PGM) at BMO. As of the end of 2020, a total of \$24,000 has been donated to the PGM. Each donor must sign a Planned Gift Agreement Form. The process of making a donation includes proposing how the funds are to be used. It is required that Session approves the proposed use of the funds. Session has approved the Gifts of Change project through the PWS&D as acceptable and consistent for a gift to the PGM of Parkwood. All of the donations to date have requested that the investment returns be designated in support of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Gifts of Change projects. These returns will begin at maturity for the separate GIC investments.

As indicated in the report for 2019, the investment strategy is to divide the total investment into five separate GICs with maturities of one through five years. For three of the investments, there is a combination of a guaranteed rate of return and a return linked to different stock market indices. This approach to investment has the benefit of the basic amount of the investment being protected by the CDIC, a guaranteed small rate of return and the possibility of a somewhat higher rate of return.

The total donation of \$24,000 has been invested or used as follows: \$19,000 is invested as described above and the newly donated \$5,000 is held in our bank account at BMO awaiting a review of investment options early in 2021.

For 2020, BMO certified that the Fund had a credited, accrued interest total of \$168.73. This accrued interest was added to the funds already invested. The asset balance in the Fund at year-end is \$24,186.73.

7. Reports of Ministry Teams

A. Policy and Planning Team

The Policy and Planning Team (P&P) is composed of elders appointed by Session, with the Minister and Clerk of Session as *ex officio* members. P&P assists Session in the general planning and policy development on matters relating to the life and work of the congregation. As of December 31, 2020, the following are members of P&P:

Dianne Nickerson, Holly MacDonald, Dennis Featherstone (*ex officio*), and Rev. James Hurd (*ex officio*).

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, we met only twice in 2020, on January 15th and February 19th. In January, we looked into the viability of on-line donations through Canada Helps. Dennis and James attended a workshop on January 29th to obtain more information about the program. It was agreed and approved that Dennis and Gord Walford be registered as representatives for gaining access to the Canada Helps website for on-line donations through them.

On the issue of structural change designed to retain or sustain unity with the denomination given the divide over issues of sexuality and marriage, we brought a recommendation to Session asking James to send an appropriate overture to General Assembly on this subject. General Assembly was originally scheduled for June 2020 but was not held due to the pandemic. We await a response to our overture.

In February, we discussed the problems we face due to the small number of active elders at Parkwood. There are many reasons why some elders cannot be active, namely age, sickness, work restrictions, home difficulties, etc. A recommendation for an elders' retreat to "brain storm" these issues was brought to Session and approved. Plans were made to hold the retreat at the end of May. However, the pandemic intervened and the retreat was postponed indefinitely. Terms of Reference for the Budget Team were discussed with a view to revision/update. This will be re-visited at a future meeting.

There is a growing need for more volunteers to fill vacant or understaffed volunteer positions, which we hope to address as soon as we can, for example, Church Historian.

May God bless us and keep us safe.

B. Worship Co-ordination Team AGM Report for 2020

Our team had only one face-to-face meeting in 2020 and that was on January 23. We set our next meeting for May 21 but that meeting never happened. From March 15 on because of COVID-19 restrictions we met through e-mails back and forth.

Our first major responsibility of 2020 was Easter. The Easter Sunrise service and the Easter breakfast at the church were cancelled. Rev. James Hurd continued to lead worship Sunday by Sunday including Lenten evening services, Maundy Thursday, Palm Sunday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday.

On Sunday, December 13 the Arise School of Dance performed via a video. This special 15minute production entitled, *Born in Me*, was presented as part of the Sunday morning worship

service in the middle of Advent. Since they were not performing live they asked that Parkwood send a donation which **with the team's approval, we** gladly did in the amount of \$200.

We are grateful to those who when asked if they would do the readings for the four Sundays in Advent were willing to do so. We also arranged the readers for the Christmas Eve and Christmas day services and again appreciate the willingness of those approached to read Scripture. Due to COVID-19 restrictions each reader had to send in their recording to the church office for inclusion in the service. We also arranged for the church to be decorated even though we were not holding the services in the sanctuary. However, the decorated tree was used each Sunday as a bright, beautiful background for all the services. Thank you to Pam Pestaluky and Holly MacDonald and a couple of their elves for a majestic effort that was appreciated by all who joined in worship throughout the Advent and Christmas weeks.

On October 2, 2020 our team along with others from Parkwood, received a request from Session for information with regard to preparation for reopening the church for in-person worship. We responded with ten directives or guidelines which each usher would agree to if they were willing to come and serve as an usher. We therefore canvassed our roster of ushers to see who would be willing to resume their ushering duties in accordance with the guidelines. We were overwhelmed with the response and willingness of each of the eleven who said they would serve. Thank you to them.

They are now on stand-by until Session deems it safe and appropriate to reopen. We appreciate the work and thought Session has put in to constantly review the possibility of re-opening.

The WCT wishes to thank Dianne Smith, our Director of Music and the choir and the musicians for all their work in 2020. It was an ever-changing challenge each week to have the music ready as everything had to be pre-recorded and then submitted on time for inclusion in the worship service. Well done – thank you. Lastly, but with much gratitude out team gives thanks to the technical team that never fail to have everything in order for Sunday morning. We start with Rev. James Hurd who manned StreamYard Sunday by Sunday. We also thank Brenda Creighton, Dan Moffet, Mohammad Raouf, Gordon Walford, Dale Tuck and Dalia Hanna our Administrative Assistant, for all their creative, resilient, adaptive efforts to make sure worship happened every Sunday morning. COVID-19 provided the challenge and these people met the challenge. Thank you from all of us. Jesus said in Matthew 16: 18 that the gates of hell will not overcome his church. Soli Deo Gloria.

The average Sunday in-person attendance in 2020, from January 1 through March 15 was 84. The average attendance in 2019 was 97.

These selections were recorded following social distancing protocol and were then blended by our very talented tech people. During the March lock-down Dianne recorded the service music from her home and sent it to Gord Walford.

Gord Walford recorded the music in the Sanctuary for the month of June and early July.

Summer supply was provided by pianist Sunny Kim who did a wonderful job making the service recordings for us. Dan Moffet and Brenda Creighton recorded the music on Tuesday evenings with Sunny during Dianne's vacation. We are very grateful to Sunny for her assistance and all her hard work.

After Dianne's return from vacation, Dan continued

to record service music, hymns and songs in the Sanctuary on Thursday evenings including the piano, band and organ. Our first attempt to prepare a remote solo recording was with Savannah Elder in early October and her recording of Back to God.

Solo voices are added by individuals recording their voice in their house on a phone or computer

while listening to a recording previously made in the Sanctuary. They return the recording to Dan for merging into the already recorded music. Late fall singers and Susanne on flute and Asuquo on sax recorded their part over the guitar and piano recordings from their homes and Dan mixed it all together. Band members include Yaman Ozcan percussion, Asuquo Eniang bass guitar and saxophone, Gord Walford guitar and Dianne Smith piano and organ.

Come the fall we had choir practice on Saturdays at 5 pm outdoors until the weather became cooler in late October when we switched to zoom. New Testament Survey Course Spring 2020

A total of twenty-five people associated with Parkwood participated in an online New Testament survey course during April through June 2020. The course was prepared by Stowe Campbell and Dom Corriveau of The Navigators to train Navigator staff. This course involved about five hours of work each week for 12 weeks. Each week there were New Testament readings that together covered the whole of the New Testament, plus a one-hour video, and a one-hour Zoom meeting (Wednesday evenings) to discuss questions, and provide an opportunity for sharing and prayer. Some participants did additional reading. The course gave an introduction to personal discipleship, biblical literary features, historical context, and vocabulary as well as showing the relationship between the New Testament and biblical theology. This was a good sharing experience while many were isolated. The level of the material was quite challenging, as was using the Zoom format. Participants had many good questions.

Our group was divided into two groups: "young adults" (ages 16-35) and "older adults" (age 35 and up). We had eleven "young adults" and eleven "older adults" participating in addition to leaders Karen Hurd, Vicky Mabie, and James Hurd. Average attendance was 20 people.

Our final Zoom class was held with both groups together and Stowe Campbell (New Zealand) answering questions about the New Testament from participants.

Participants expressed appreciation for the course. All were encouraged to learn more about discipleship and use other free courses available from The Navigators online.

Victoria Mabie Youth and Young Adults

Youth and Young Adults 2020

What a year it has been! it was definitely not the year I was expecting when I started planning youth group and high school Sunday school at Parkwood.

The year started out strong with a few events occurring outside the church and around the city.

In January, roughly half a dozen youth, along with myself and another adult volunteer, attended a conference at the Metropolitan Bible Church called *Just Ask*. This was a full day event hosted together by Exousia, a local group supporting youth ministry, youth workers and the church, and Ravi Zacharias International Ministries. The day was made up of large group sessions and smaller sessions focusing on specific topics. The youth were welcomed and encouraged to ask questions about what they were wrestling with and what they were curious about.





February started out with a small group going tobogganing at Mooney's Bay, followed by a stop at Tim Horton's afterwards for hot chocolate. We ended the month by participating in the *Coldest Night of the Year* walk, with the money we raised going to help the Ottawa Mission. We had 11 people join the five kilometer walk (nine youth, two adults), where we started at the Shaw Centre



went through downtown, stopped at the Ottawa Mission for a quick snack, a spot to warm up, and a brief talk on what the Ottawa Mission does, and then through Sandy Hill and back to the Shaw Centre. When we got back to the Shaw Centre, a light chili dinner was provided for us and the other participants to eat while we warmed up.

At the beginning of March, we had an event at the church where we made cake pops, had a devotion and played a few games. A trampolining event had been planned for the March Break but was cancelled after the province was shut down due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In April, we began a New Testament study over Zoom for the youth and young adults, which started out with approximately 12 students participating. I co-led this group with Karen and James Hurd, meeting every Wednesday night for an hour or so, working through each of the books in the New Testament. The participants would read the assigned books during the week leading up to the meeting and come with their questions. Many good questions and answers were raised during these sessions.

Most years, the youth at Parkwood attend a conference on Good Friday at the Metropolitan Bible Church called *No Other Name*. This year, the put together a virtual event that was live streamed on the afternoon of Good Friday. This online conference included speakers who spoke of Jesus being the name above all names, worship time and a live chat where people could post comments and guestions.

During this time, I tried reaching out to the youth in some different ways, trying to keep them engaged, connecting with others, and knowing they were not alone during a very challenging time. I posted questions and quizzes on the Parkwood Youth Facebook and Instagram pages. I recorded a few videos to reinforce that we are not alone, giving messages of the hope that we find in Jesus. We started up youth events again a little later in the spring, having meetings on Zoom once every couple of weeks with games and a Bible discussion.

In June, we had four youth graduating from grade eight and three youth graduating from grade 12. As a way to congratulate them, a number of people sent in video messages that were compiled into one larger video. These were then sent to each of the graduates.



We had a summer student, Sarah, who worked with the youth in July and August, who planned a number of activities for them. She led online Zoom youth events, including a couple Bible trivia nights, and a 'Christmas in July' event. She helped connect some of our youth with the Korean Church for a Narnia study. The student also organized a music video and Bible verse video where the kids and youth enthusiastically took part. Both of these videos were included in the online Sunday morning worship services.

In September, we got back to a more regular schedule, having a youth event on Zoom every second Friday night. These consisted of more nights with games and devotions and Bible discussions. We also attended an online conference called *Change Conference*, where the youth listened to different speakers and participated in game activities by responding to questions in the chat. This event was attended by youth from across Canada.

Our final meeting before Christmas was our annual Christmas party, which felt a little different from other years as we were still meeting on Zoom. We played some Christmas related games and trivia, had a small talent show, and a Christmas devotion.

In September, we also started up high school Sunday school online, meeting each Sunday on Zoom at 11: 15am for roughly 45 minutes. We have been working through a curriculum by David C. Cook that works through the spiritual gifts, looking at what they are, giving Biblical examples and then giving the youth space to apply it to their own lives and how they could work on trying out that gift in the coming week to see if it is one of the spiritual gifts God has given them. Leading up to Christmas, we switched to a 4-week Advent series by J. D. Greear, where he takes a deeper look at the names given to Jesus in Isaiah and how they show us more about who He really is.

Learning to connect with and engage the youth completely online for the majority of the year has definitely come with its challenges but has also allowed me to see some good things happening. Connections throughout the week have increased. They are asking more questions and it is evident that they are thinking a lot about their faith and their own lives and their futures. I do feel that relationships have deepened between the youth, as well as between the youth and the leaders.

It has definitely been a year like no other, but I can see God working through it and in the lives of the youth and young adults. A big thank you to everyone who has helped out with making the youth ministry and young adult ministries possible. I could not do it without you and am forever grateful for how you have helped speak truth into the lives of our young people.

LOGOS Program

Logos is Parkwood's mid-week activity for children in grades 1-8. We had planned to hold Logos on our regular schedule, which is 12 nights of Logos beginning in February and then 10 weeks beginning in September. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic we were forced to cancel Logos and were only able to meet in person from January 29th to March 3rd. There were approximately 20 children enrolled and we had up to 4 high school students volunteer on any given night. We rented and used the Elizabeth Wyn Wood Alternate School gymnasium again this year for the 6 weeks that we were able to meet. Before the closure, the children had been learning the actions to a fun and lively song "My Lighthouse". Over the summer they were encouraged to video themselves doing the actions to the song. These videos were edited and put together by Parkwood's summer student, Sarah Driediger, to create a fun and encouraging montage that was played during Parkwood's online service and distributed via the e-letter. Special thanks to John Harder for providing the musical accompaniment.

In the fall it was decided that we should try to hold a Logos-like activity night on Zoom. From November 18- December 9th (Wednesday nights for 1-**1.5 hours) we held "ZOGOS" for children** From grades 5-8. Victoria Mabie was the leader with Holly MacDonald assisting. Each night had a theme, a game and a Bible lesson and lots of time to chat and catch up with each o**ther's** news. This proved to be a fun and valuable activity with between 4 and 8 children participating. We have planned more for the New Year until we are back to in-person Logos!

While we were having in-person Logos, Holly MacDonald was director of Logos and Victoria Mabie was decorating the Fellowship Hall each week for the themes. We had a regular staff of 14 adult volunteers at Logos, with various others helping from time to time. These motivated, caring and creative people, from our congregation, cooked, served and cleaned up theme-based dinners, taught Bible and worship skills and planned and supervised games and recreation. D. Pastoral Care

The members of Parkwood's Pastoral Care Team are: Rev. James Hurd, Margaret Roach, Betty Paul, Dale Tuck, Barbara and Duane Townsend, Dora Brown, and Laura Game (LOA). Rev. Hurd is chair and Dora Brown secretary.

The team met monthly, except in July and August, at the church January, February and March and by Zoom April to December to review activities, discuss current issues and pray together. Each meeting was opened with devotions by a team **member. Due to Duane's illness Duane and** Barbara have not participated in Zoom meetings.

During our meetings we discussed the impact of the pandemic on our community and in Long Term Care Homes. Following a request by session, we submitted our suggestions for returning to church services and programs in the church building. We expressed our concerns about the need for physical distancing, masks and sanitizing protocols and the oversite of implementing them.

During the events in the USA we questioned if we are sensitive to acts of discrimination in our community and church and confirmed that we all have a responsibility for justice and equality.

Communion worship services for members who have difficulty attending regular Sunday Services were discontinued. Team members made phone calls to those on our pastoral care list and other members of the congregation to keep in contact and check how they were coping.

Lunch and Learn events were discontinued. Dora has asked if there is an interest in having virtual Lunch and Learn events.

Betty Paul and Dora Brown, were spiritual care volunteers at Peter D. Clark Long Term Care Home, visiting residents and bringing residents to worship services up until March. Dora helped to chair the **Home's Spiritual Care Committee and to plan** spiritual care visits and regular worship and memorial services for the residents. Rev. Hurd served on the Home Spiritual Care Committee. A Presbyterian mid-week worship service was held once a month at the Home conducted by John Fair. All spiritual care volunteers and weekly worship services were discontinued in March at Peter D. Clark. Worship services at Starwood Nursing Home, Crystal View Lodge and Cederview Retirement Residence were also discontinued in March.

The team provided large-**print "Today" devoti**onal booklets to the Peter D. Clark residents, and to individuals within Parkwood Church and beyond that **were mailed out by the church office. "Today"** booklets were also placed by the church office in the **Gathering Place** to be available for pickup by any interested persons.

The Prayer Chain, co-ordinated by Jean Elder continued to contact prayer members weekly by email and as new prayer requests were received.

Barbara Townsend coordinated the sending of "Journeying Through Grief" booklets to families or individuals who had suffered a loss. The booklets expressed care and support for those grieving. Laura Game on behalf of the Pastoral Care team sent cards and notes to congregation members who had experienced a loss of a loved one, for those recovering from an illness and for special occasions.

Team members Margaret Roach and Dora Brown who visited patients of the Presbyterian faith at the Ottawa Hospital Civic Campus and at the Queensway Carleton Hospital were discontinued in March by the hospitals due to the pandemic. Rev. Hurd is the Presbyterian Presbytery representative on Queensway Carleton Hospital Pastoral Care Advisory Committee.

The Ottawa Pastoral Care Training Program, which is part of the requirements to be eligible to serve as a pastoral care visitor in hospitals was cancelled. The Program held continuing education events by Zoom on Spiritual Care in the era of Physical Distancing and one on Medical Assistance in Dying for current pastoral care team members.

There is a need for more congregation members to take the Pastoral Care Training Program when it **restarts and to become members of Parkwood's** Pastoral Care Team.

Prayer Requests were circulated to members of the Prayer Chain by Jean Elder. The total requests for 2020 were 664 and expressions of thanks numbered 177.

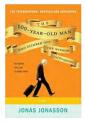

Barrhaven Bible Study Group

The year 2020 was the start of our tenth year together as a group of 15-16. We had begun the study group on January 16, 2011. In 2020 due to health related issues some had to withdraw. The beginning of the year saw us conclude our study of the Westminster Confession of Faith which we had started on October 3, 2018. It was one of the longest studies we had undertaken but throughout the many months it proved to be a worthwhile study of one of the most comprehensive theological statements that has endured the test of time. It continues to be, since 1646, a solid doctrinal and theological guide and instruction in the Christian faith for Presbyterians and other denominations that recognize its supreme value and worth for every Christian. Its strength, value, worth and relevance comes from its source which is the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament. Every statement is solidly backed by Scripture. Our study produced over 100 pages of notes which each attendee was furnished with week by week. I thank the group for their perseverance, faithfulness and interest. We then planned for our next study and with the consensus of the group we were to begin Paul's epistle to the Philippians, Martha and I were going to be away and the plan was to start up again in early April. Then came -COVID-19. We were out of action until October 6, 2020 when we were able to start again using ZOOM. We did not know how many would join us on-line but we were overwhelmed by the response. We have a group now of 24, of which 14 come from other churches. We give God thanks and the glory.

Martha sends out the ZOOM link every week and the attendance has been excellent. What will happen when COVID-19 ends we do not know. But we know who holds the future so we leave it all in God's grace and plan.

Parkwood Church has had a presence on the world-wide web since April 1996. The site is maintained by Gord Walford. During 2020 sermons were recorded mainly through the sound system and audio files posted online up to March 22. Subsequently services have been held online, either livestreamed or pre-recorded; video recordings of these services are archived on our YouTube channel, "Parkwood Ottawa". Production of the videos involves a considerable number of people, in particular Dan Moffet & Brenda Creighton, Mohammad Raouf and Gord Walford. Weekly bulletins, monthly calendars and Pulse newsletters as well as frequent e-letters since September are provided by the office admin, events coordinator Brenda Creighton and the Pulse editor, Carrie Morris. The Pulse has reverted to mainly an online version, although a print version is available through the church office. A one-year archive of newsletters is available online. Thanks to all who contribute.



During 2020 statistics show number of visits remained steady at an average of 220 per month, number of pages visited declined slightly, number of hits increased 20% and bandwidth used increased over 35%. Most popular pages are the **"home" page (1**5,000 views), the main news page (2,000 views) and the "contact us" page (1,800 views); also quite popular was the entry page set up for mobile devices such as smartphones and tablets (1,100 views). The two donation pages have been visited 370 times. Observations indicate that the maximum number of households watching the online service over 38 services since Apr. 26/20 is 49. Parkwood continues to maintain a presence on Facebook. Posts to our Facebook page tend to be links to the livestreamed and pre-recorded services. In addition to the webservant, our minister, Christian Education Support Worker and the CE Team person who is liaison with RightNow Media have editing/posting privileges. In addition to our main Facebook page, Parkwood Youth have a presence on Facebook maintained by our CE Support Worker.

G. Mission Team

In spite of the numerous difficulties and various safety precautions brought about as a result of the Covid 19 challenges, the Mission Team was able to continue on remarkably well.

It is only fit**ting to start the year's report with an** expression of thanks to those who assisted us in overcoming a problem caused, in essence, by the closing down of easy access to our downstairs Mission Team Bulletin Board. The Mission Team considers the downstairs Bulletin Board to be our major ongoing communication option with which we communicate mission challenges and needs to the congregation.

The Web Site, The Pulse, The E-mail Letter, the Sunday Bulletins and indeed even the AGM Report in the absence of normal access to our downstairs Bulletin Board, all became significantly more importance to us as useful communication tools and options. As a consequence, special long-due thanks of appreciation are offered to Dalia Hanna, Brenda Creighton, Carrie Morris, and Gord Walford, The Office staff who are always helpful and supportive of the Mission promotion work especially exceeded themselves this year. Their special efforts are greatly recognized by the Mission Team. Other helpers too numerous to mention are also well known to us and according to Hebrews 6:10, also to God.

2020 is the year that introduced some of us to hands on Zoom meeting technology for a first-time experience, where, under the guidance of Rev James Hurd we were shepherded along successfully. The decision to use Zoom meetings for our monthly gatherings, greatly helped us to engage together in the planning, preparation, and presentation of the various Mission Team Ministry projects that were able to be accomplished throughout the year.

Special Appeals:

The Mission Team has been humbled by the faithful support given through out the year, by our Church family members. We recognized we faced a challenge of sacrificial donation stress at a time of even greater need for additional mission- outreach assistance, brought on by the crippling effects of the Covid 19 pandemic. To that end, it was decided to limit our number of Special Appeals in the year, from the normal 4 to just two. The two selected Special Appeal recipients in 2020 were:

1. Amethyst Women's Addiction Centre:

Amethyst Women's Addiction Centre serves women in need and is located right here in Ottawa. The Mission of Amethyst Women's Addiction Centre is to offer alternative addiction services to women. Amethyst works toward changing unjust social structures that place women at risk of addiction. Amethyst addresses and communicates the specific ways in which substance use and / or problem gambling affect women's well-being and why social change is necessary. Parkwood Church received \$160 in support of this Special Appeal ministry.

2. Bright Hope for Tomorrow:

Bright Hope for Tomorrow Mission shares the love of Christ with people by partnering with indigenous Churches, helping the poor produce a product and providing relief to people in crisis. It brings hope to those who live in extreme poverty and who earn less than two dollars a day. Parkwood Church received \$375 in support of this Special Appeal ministry.

In addition, two unexpected Presbyterian Church in Canada requests for assistance were brought before the congregation by the Mission Team during the year:

- Lebanon Relief Disaster: PWS&D reported that \$143,000 was received in response to the Lebanon crisis from Presbyterians across Canada.
- The Near East School of Theology, (NEST). The request in support of the NEST recovery from their explosion received \$275 from Parkwood Church. This donation was immediately matched by the International Ministries Department of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The congregation is to be commended for having responded so quickly to these requests. Based on Presbyterian Church in Canada reports received later on, the donations were eagerly welcomed and accepted by those who had been hit so hard through the unexpected disaster. No doubt, their disaster-stress-level was greatly increased during this special time of world- wide concern and anxiety.

The Christian Salvage Ministry:

We have been able to renew a local volunteer contact with this important Christian ministry. The **ministry accepts donated "gently used" Christian** Literature. Once the donations arrive at their warehouse in Hamilton, they are sorted out and placed in an overseas shipping container for eventual delivery to Africa (sometimes India). Upon arrival the literature is freely distributed through local Christian Churches within the selected region.

This year our Parkwood Office has been able to renew local contact with this important Christian ministry through a representative who lives in the Kars, Ont. Area. Thanks to Brenda Creighton and Dan Moffet, 10 boxes of Christian Literature were offered on behalf of Parkwood and accepted for eventual delivery sometime after the present Ottawa lock down period ends.

Operation Christmas Child:

The Operation Christmas Child project brings joy, hope and the message of God's love to boys and girls who are the victims of war, disease, and poverty. Thanks to those who participated this year, Parkwood Church contributed 44 shoe boxes that were filled with toys, gifts, and prayers in support of this exciting outreach program.

Church Around the World:

As we did not have any idea how long will be required for normal circumstances of church worship and fellowship to recommence, we decided to order a digitized version of the Church Around the World information update Bulletin.

H. Facility Management Team

The Facility Management Team is assigned the following responsibilities:

- a) Maintenance of the church building, property and equipment
- b) Provision of necessary furnishings and equipment for all users of the church building
- c) Oversee work of IT Team in its management of the computer infrastructure.

- d) Direction and support of the Administrative Assistant (in conjunction with the Minister)
- e) Direction and support of the Caretaker
- f) Direction and support of the Events Coordinator
- g) Maintenance of a secure space for the required retention of church records.

2020 has been a unique year for each of us. With church services and the use of the facility for other purposes suspended in March, 2020, the tasks of facility maintenance have also been constrained. We have reduced the hours of work for the Administrative Assistant and the Caretaker; however, their efforts have been essential to maintain the worship and mission activities of Parkwood.

We anticipate that this curtailment will stretch into the 2nd or 3rd quarter of 2021. Some of the maintenance projects that we had hoped to undertake in 2020 have been postponed. Some of the tasks completed in 2020 include:

- 1. Revision and updating of the Emergency Response Plan
- 2. Conducting of an inventory of all equipment and furnishings in the building.
- 3. Improvements in IT infrastructure, including installation of a security camera on the front entrance.

However, several projects cannot be delayed indefinitely and we hope to address these starting in 2021:

- 1. The replacement of windows that are badly deteriorated.
- 2. Painting or cladding of the external woodwork of the building.
- 3. Replacement of the stacking chairs in the Fellowship Hall and in meeting rooms.

As noted in previous Annual reports, the cost of these projects exceeds the provisions in our **Team's annual bud**get for Facility repairs and maintenance but we will prioritize the work and begin a phased approach to addressing these issues. The Facility Management Team has identified other major maintenance projects to be addressed, such as the replacement of the lighting in the Fellowship Hall, and the replacement of carpeting throughout the building, but has assigned a lower priority to these projects.

The Facility Management Team has reviewed the job performance of the Administrative Assistant and the Caretaker and we feel that each of the incumbents is performing at a high level in the respective positons.

We appreciate the dedication of Brenda Creighton in fulfilling the role of Events Coordinator. We appreciate the work of the Furnishings Group, under Alta MacFie's leadership and the IT team under the leadership of Andrew McGregor (See following reports.)

This year we worked on the following:

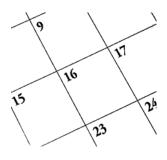
• Installed upgrades to the Windows operating systems on all computers and laptops.

- Installed new versions of the Church Windows software which is used in the office to prepare documents like the Congregational Directory and the Christmas and Easter letters.
- Andrew prepared a laptop with required software for the Summer Programs Assistant so she could work offsite.
- At the request of Session, Andrew purchased on behalf of the church, a subscription to Zoom Pro so Parkwood groups could meet remotely.
- Google Suites Email project to replace all personal addresses for team leaders on the church website to non-personal email addresses is on hold because of the pandemic.
- Andrew investigated and arranged for upgrading of the internet service in the building which allows us to livestream from the Sanctuary. The new package is a saving to the budget but with much more capacity.
- Arranged for the office email and phone messages to be retrieved remotely for the Admin Assistant Office and Summer Programs Assistant. Provided documentation and training for same.
- Brenda does weekly Norton antivirus and Windows updates and backups of the network which are stored offsite.
- With the pandemic, there was a need to find other ways to use our existing equipment to record worship services. Dan Moffet arranged for a consultant to provide recommendations on problems with the sound board and the equipment used to make audio recordings. We have replaced microphones and purchased cables which allow us to record in a new way. Dan also replaced defective cable connectors and labelled all cables with their length. He arranged, with approval from Facility Management, to purchase and install replacement track lights in the Sanctuary to provide more lighting for the video recordings.
- Regan Rambally continues to support and troubleshoot the telephone. He also researched possible **replacements for the system which is "end of life in 2022".**
- Asuquo Eniang continues to program the outside electronic sign.
- Gord Walford maintains the website and provides behind the scenes support for office email.

Andrew moved to Kingston in December but continues to provide support remotely.

I. Finance Team

There are several volunteers who handle the various aspects of the financial affairs of Parkwood. Betty Paul is the Envelope Secretary and maintained an accounting system for donations and income received. Dianne Nickerson prepared cheques to pay non-payroll invoices. Dennis Featherstone prepared cheques to forward donations for special appeals and the donations budgeted for the Mission Team. Ugo Kejeh is the Treasurer, prepared the monthly payroll and posted all cheques to the SAGE overall accounting system. Kathy Newton prepared the bank reconciliation and financial statements and also made various adjustments. Ugo then prepared the standard monthly financial statement for use by each team and communication to the congregation.

Loan Repayment Fund

As shown in Table LR1, the donation to the Loan Repayment Fund in 2020 was \$13,251 which included a significant one-time memorial gift. The total donation less the required payment led to an increase in the fund balance of \$6,959 bringing the total balance in the fund to \$13,932. Three extra payments (2016, 2017 and 2019) have totalled \$13,394 which decreased the loan repayment period by over two years and saved interest payments of roughly \$8,100.

Coming Sharp Increase in Loan Repayments

The primary loan of \$100,000 from the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation is interest free for seven years, has a repayment schedule lasting 16 years, and if a congregation repays the loan by the end of the twelfth year (2027) then the interest paid will be refunded. The secondary loan of \$30,000 from the Presbytery of Ottawa requires repayment of principal and interest over a five-year period from 2023 to 2027. The individual and total required repayments are set out in Table LR2. As shown, the annual repayment by 2023 is well over double the current repayment obligation.

Repayment Strategy

The general strategy underlying the annual targets for donations and loan repayments has been to target annual givings of \$10,000; to try to have a year-end balance in the fund equivalent to or greater than the required payment for the following year; and to make a recommendation for an extra payment on the loan from time to time. With a current balance of \$13,932 in the fund, one option would be to send our entire "extra" balance of \$6,890 (\$13,932 less required payment of \$7,042) as an extra payment. A second option would be more cautious with our extra payment because of the sharp increase coming in loan repayments. An extra payment of \$3,000 would be consistent with this more cautious approach. (This would reduce interest payments by \$1,625 in addition to the reduction in principal of \$3,000) A third option would be to not make an extra payment at this time to keep our reserve in the face of the forthcoming jump in repayment requirements.

Before the pandemic struck, Parkwood had begun discussions on ways to do fundraising. Indeed, some fundraising events were planned for 2020 until they were cancelled due to the virus. Once Parkwood is reopen for public worship there will be a need for fundraising to assist with the magnitude of the loan repayments.

Recommendation A: That the congregation approve a target of \$10,000 for offering to the Loan Repayment Fund in 2021.

Recommendation B: That the congregation approve a repayment in 2021 of the required amount of \$7,042 plus an additional \$3,000 for a total repayment of \$10,042.

PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended December 31, 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

These financial statements report on the activities of Parkwood Presbyterian Church, 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario. The Church was originally established in February 1965.

The Church operates exclusively as a not-for-profit organization and as such is exempt from income tax. The Church is a registered charity.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, except for the following;

The church building and furnishings are stated at estimated replacement value based on an insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016.

The land is stated at nominal value as the cost is not determinable.

These statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting other than HST recoverable which is accrued at the time the expenditure to which it relates is incurred.

The following significant accounting principles have been used in preparation of these financial statements:

Revenue recognition:

Donations are recorded as revenue in the year in which they are received unless designated for a future period in which case they are deferred and taken into revenue in the period in which the related expenditure is made.

Financial instruments:

The Church's financial instruments are comprised of cash on hand and in the bank, short-term financial instruments, HST recoverable, current and long-term liabilities. All financial instruments are reported at their fair values on the statement of financial position. The fair values are the same as the carrying values due to the nature of the financial instruments. Unless disclosed elsewhere in the notes to the financial statements, it is management's opinion that the Church is not exposed to significant interest rate, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of asset and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. BUILDINGS AND FURNISHINGS:

The Church building and furnishing are recorded at estimated replacement value at December 31, 2017 based on the most recent insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016. The value of the Building and Furnishings at this time was estimated at \$2,628,751. The cost of land at 10 Chesterton Drive is recorded at a nominal value of \$1.

3. SECURED LOAN PAYABLE:

Lending Fund Loan

In December 2015, the Church secured a loan of \$65,000 from the Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church in <u>Canada</u> (the Fund). The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015.

PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended December 31, 2020

In July 2016, the Church secured a further advance of \$35,000 from the Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada which was also obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building, as approved at its

The Lending Fund loan is secured by a charge on the land and building at 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario.

The loan is interest free for the first 6 years, with 7% interest per annum on the outstanding balance thereafter from the 7th to the 15th year. Payments on the loan are to be made quarterly, based on a predetermined repayment schedule with interest amounts being added to the principal repayment amount beginning in the 7th year (2022). Extra payments on principal may be made at no cost, providing advance notice of the payment is provided.

The total principal repayment due in the 12 months ending December 31, 2021 is \$7,042.

Extension Fund Loan

Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016.

In May 2016, the Church secured a loan of \$30,000 from the <u>Extension Fund of the Presbyterian Church in</u> <u>Canada, the Presbytery of Ottawa</u>. The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016.

The Loan is unsecured and repayable in full, by May 9, 2027. There will be no interest charged on or before May 9, 2022. Should any portion of the loan be outstanding as of May 10, 2022 there will be interest charged on the outstanding balance at an annual rate of interest equal to the average GIC rate of interest available from the 5 largest Canadian chartered banks.

Principal repayments of the loan are due as follows: \$6,000 due annually, on or before each of the following dates: May 9, 2023; May 9, 2024, May 9, 2025; May 9, 2026; and May 9, 2027.

4. INTERFUND TRANSFERS:

During the year ended December 31, 2020 the following transfers between funds were made:

During the year a total of \$6,292 was transferred from the Loan Repayment Fund to the Operating Fund, for the purpose of principal repayments on the Secured Loan Payable.

During the year a total of \$5,000 was transferred from the Planned Giving Fund to the external Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund account currently held at BMO to be invested in accordance with the terms of reference passed by Session on June 25, 2018.

5. ENDOWMENT/PLANNED GIVING MINISTRY FUND:

The Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund is restricted and accounts for donations received where the donor requested that the principal be maintained by the Church on a permanent basis, or for a specified fixed term, with the interest earned by the invested principal to be allocated for a specific purpose approved by Session.

6. INTERNAL BORROWING:

At the Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015 a motion was approved by the congregation to borrow internally from the Organ Replacement Fund for purposes of funding the proposed building construction project. The total transferred from the Organ Replacement Fund to the Building Replacement Fund during the year ended December 31, 2016, was \$15,000. This internal loan was made on an interest-free basis with no fixed terms of repayment.

10. New Business



Dianne Nickerson Budget Team

A. Budget Team Report and Recommendations

Overview of 2020

In the face of a challenging year for everyone, most organizations experienced a decline in income. Parkwood was no exception. Still, over \$260,000 was donated to Parkwood or received in rental income and other recoveries. This is a blessing for which we should be very thankful, despite the total being down \$21,000 from 2019. Parkwood qualified to apply for the Federal Wage Subsidy due to the decline in total income. A subsidy of over \$13,000 was received which is another reason to give thanks.

For local purposes, offerings were down \$18,000 and rental income was down nearly \$5,000. Expenditures for local purposes were about \$17,000 less than in 2019, in large part due to the building not being open for public worship. The potential deficit of nearly \$8,000 combined with the subsidy led to a surplus for local purposes of \$6,623.

The greater part of the decline in expenditures in 2020 was centered in the budget for Facility Management. Part of the decline was due to reduced operating expenses from the building not being open for worship for over nine months of the year. Another part of the decline was due to proposed equipment repairs, and replacement not being undertaken. The repairs and replacement need to be done at some point and will put pressure on the budget in future years.

Financial Goals for 2021

The three major financial goals continue to be:

- Keep Parkwood Church a desirable place to worship by having sufficient staff, an attractive and safe building and support for a range of programs
- Make a significant contribution to the Loan Repayment Fund

Make our target for donations to the
 Presbyterians Sharing program

The process to prepare a budget for 2021 requires an assumption about when the church will reopen for public worship. For budget purposes, the underlying assumption is that the church will reopen for public worship on September 19. The actual decision to reopen will be taken by Session based on the appropriate factors which Session has considered in addressing this question during 2020. A decision to open earlier or later than September 19 would have some unknown effect on the actual budget expenditures for 2021.

There is a question of how the surplus for local purposes for 2020 should be viewed and used. The Budget Team is of the view that it should be viewed in combination with the budget for 2021 because the pandemic is affecting operations for both years. Specifically, the surplus for 2020 would be used to partially offset any deficit for 2021.

The process to reduce the proposed and in some cases postponed expenditures for 2021 was very difficult. It was a challenge to develop a way for a specific inclusion in the budget or to put a plan in place to handle major repairs such as for the piano. If such an emergency were to become a reality, it might be a challenge to use fundraising or any other reliance on the interaction of people to raise the required funds during the pandemic.

Recommendation #1

The Budget Team recommends that the surplus for Local Purposes in 2020 be used to offset any deficit for Local Purposes in 2021.

Recommendation #2

The Budget Team recommends that the congregation approve expenditures for Local Purposes of \$217,656 in 2021 (line 22 in the table)

Recommendation #3

The Budget Team recommends that the congregation approve a target for offerings for Local Purposes of \$200,000 in 2021 (line 1 in the table)

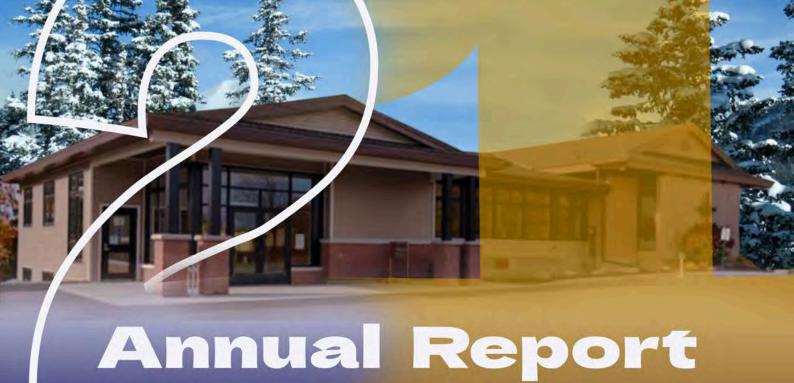

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A Word from the Minister

"I always thank God for you because of his grace given you in Christ Jesus. For in him you have been enriched in every way —i n all your speaking and in all your knowledge — because our testimony about Christ was confirmed in you. Therefore you do not lack any spiritual gift as you eagerly wait for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed. The minister called to meeting to order at 7:05 p.m., leading in prayer, and reading 1 Corinthians 3: 10b-4: 5, offering brief comment thereon, and again leading in prayer.

The chair called for the election of a secretary. D. Nickerson, seconded by J. Huber, placed in nomination the name of D. Featherstone, who signified his willingness to serve. The chair called for further nominations, after which it was moved by P. Pestaluky, seconded by D. Nickerson, and agreed, that nominations cease.

The chair declared D. Featherstone elected as secretary by acclamation.

The Moderator reviewed the major developments underlying the upcoming General Assembly in early June:

- As background, the evolving history of the consideration for the change in the definition of marriage, from 2017 to the present
- Approximately 20 per cent of the PCC has a first language other than English (Korean, Arabic, Hungarian, etc) and generally they have a strong attachment to the PCC
- Parkwood and several other congregations have prepared overtures on the development of two synods for consideration should the upcoming votes on the definition of marriage and eligibility for ordination be in favour of a change
- The first overture on gracious dismissal originated with the Grace Orleans session and has been followed by 17 similar overtures
- The Assembly Council does not want to consider an existing report on gracious dismissal until after the resolution of the two remits
- While the current plan is for the General Assembly to meet via ZOOM in early June, there is an overture requesting that major decisions be delayed until General Assembly can meet in person.

In advance of the meeting, a copy of a summary letter and a series of questions and answers were circulated to the congregation via the e-newsletter. Those in attendance were invited to ask questions or to provide comments on the circulated questions and answers. In summary, there were four areas of question and comment:

Remits B and C: The remits will be voted on separately because they are independent questions.

Two Synods: The comments generally reflected doubt on the overall benefit of two synods, and in particular that equal benefits would be available to both synods.

Gracious dismissal: Session was encouraged to review the evolving thinking on the concept and to study it further to be able to provide details.

Other: There were pleas for no change to the existing position on the definition of marriage. Also, there were questions about how well the approximately 400 commissioners to the General Assembly would be able to represent the preferences of the over 70,000 members of the PCC.

To assess the degree of support for the session's position on the definition of marriage and eligibility for ordination, two questions were put via an anonymous electronic poll:

Poll question #1

Does the congregation support the session's position that the current definition of marriage as stated in the confessions (Westminster Confession of Faith and Living Faith) should continue to be upheld?

Yes – 36

No - 6

Undecided - 3

Total votes cast - 45

Poll question #2

Do you support the position of the session that the current standards for ordination as ministers and elders remain as they are currently?

Yes - 35

No - 7

Undecided - 5

Total votes cast - 47

It was moved by Brenda Featherstone and seconded by John Huber that we adjourn and John Huber, John Fair and the Moderator adjourned the meeting with prayer at 9:25 p.m.

6. Reports of Session Officers



Dennis Featherstone Clerk of Session

A. Clerk of Session

The main activities of session during 2021 were the preparations and communications concerning the important General Assembly (GA) meeting in June as well as the monitoring of the general COVID situation to determine when we should have inperson worship services.

The work concerning the voting on Remit B and Remit C at GA included:

- Prepared for a special meeting of session in early March to discuss what and how to communicate to the congregation the possible effects of the voting on the two Remits
- prepared a two-page note on the two remits and Parkwood's position on the issues for circulation in advance of the congregational meeting
- circulated the minutes of the special congregational meeting on May 1 to all those on the email list kept by the church office. Fifty-three members and adherents were present for the meeting held by ZOOM. The congregation strongly supported the session's position on the continuation of marriage as the union of one man and one woman.
- reviewed the Minister's eight-page report on the voting and procedures used for the GA in early June. Elders were disappointed with how the business was conducted.
- observed that both Remit B and Remit C passed at GA by essentially a two-thirds' majority vote
- reaffirmed unanimously its position on marriage within the Christian church as being the union of one man and one

- woman and that the standards of conduct expected for pastors and elders should remain unchanged
- sent a letter to like-minded congregations to share wisdom and planning as well as to offer support and encouragement after the voting as GA
- initiated an exploration of networking among like-minded congregations in the Presbytery and the first meeting of representatives from four such local congregations was held in November

The work on reviewing when we should re-open for in-person worship included:

- set up a sub-group within session to review developments during the summer
- reviewed the frequent guidelines issued by Ottawa Public Health
- monitored how other congregations were responding to COVID developments
- decided to reopen for in-person worship on September 5 with advance registration and other conditions for attendance
- decided on December 20 to suspend inperson worship until further notice due to the rapid spread of the omicron variant of COVID

Other activities during 2021 included:

- prepared a summary of the many contributions made by Jan Sheridan as an elder at Parkwood for 50 years for submission to and publication in the Presbyterian Connection
- sent a letter of commendation to Vicky Mabie for her ongoing work with the youth at Parkwood during the pandemic
- reviewed a draft term of reference for the Media Support Team

As of December 31, 2021, the following are the Ruling Elders of Parkwood: Dennis Featherstone, Clerk; Daniel Akat; Asuquo Eniang; Laura Game; Marcia Harten; John Huber; James Hurd, Minister and Moderator; Holly MacDonald; Alta MacFie; Paul Mkandawire; Dianne Nickerson; Pamela Pestaluky; Mohammad Raouf, Linda Robinson; Dale Tuck; and Gordon Walford. Kris Marion is on leave. In 2021, session suffered the loss of elders Jean Sida, Duane Townsend and Marion Campbell with their passing. Susan McCullough requested and was granted her demit as elder after many years of contribution as an elder, as a teacher in the Church School and recently as co-ordinator of the Benevolent Fund.

Dennis Featherstone retired as clerk at the end of the year after 10 years of service. Paul Mkandawire was nominated and approved to become the Clerk commencing January 1, 2022.

D. Representative Elder Report

The Presbytery of Ottawa consists of twenty churches and mission work, the Jesus the Only Way Arabic Evangelical Mission which began in 2015 as an initiative of Grace Church, Orleans. The Presbytery in partnership with the Presbytery of Seaway-Glengarry employs a part-time Ministry Animator, Cheryl Gaver. The presbytery also oversees the operation of Gracefield camp through a Board of Directors. During 2021 the presbytery saw the closing of the Barrhaven Mission; no departures, retirements, or inductions: one minister continues as stated supply - Ruth Draffin at Rockland Community Church. Two churches are vacant: St. Andrew's Aylmer (operating under a long-term supply arrangement) and Trinity Carp, which became vacant at the end of 2020. The presbytery met six times in 2021.

I serve Synod as the convener of the Finance Committee and as such am a member of Synod Council. The Synod consists of five Presbyteries: Quebec, Montreal, Seaway-Glengarry, Ottawa and Lanark-Renfrew. Synod Council met twice in 2021, in April and September, via Zoom; Synod met in October, and hosted a conference on the same weekend conference on the theme "Climate Control: What Can I Do?" James also sits on Synod Council, as clerk of our presbytery.

Our minister is the Presbytery Clerk; the Moderator is Jonathan Dent, minister at Grace church, Orleans. A number of Parkwood people sit on Presbytery committees.

It has been an honour and a privilege to represent Parkwood at Presbytery and Synod this past year. The Presbyterian Church in Canada continues to face considerable challenges, especially navigating through the issue of human sexuality.

General Assembly in June 2021 adopted two contentious remits that threaten the future of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as we know it.

Dennis Featherstone Clerk of Session

I. Planned Giving Ministry Report

Another \$5,000 was donated in 2021 to the Planned Giving Fund. A "direct" donation of \$25 was also received to cover fees imposed by BMO on transactions in the bank account. These donations were transferred to the separate bank account for the Planned Giving Ministry at BMO. As of the end of 2021, a total of \$29,000 has been donated to the PGM through our accounts. Of this total \$28,000 has been invested in various GICs at BMO and are protected by the CDIC. An amount of \$1,000 remains in the bank account. The return on investments continues to accrue and will become cash at the maturity of the various investments.

The initial strategy for the use of the donations was to hold them long-term and to send the investment return (interest and/or the return linked to different stock market indices) to the project as designated by the person making the donation. At this time, all designations have been in support of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, Gifts of Change projects.

During 2021, a review of the overall strategy was initiated. Various questions were asked. Could a higher rate of interest be obtained at another financial institution but with the investment still protected by the CDIC?

Was the interest from maturing GICs being set aside by BMO for use by Parkwood or was it "rolled over" along with the principal into another GIC at the maturity date? Should a minimum annual amount be the target for the amount of money to be sent in support of the Gifts of Change or any other designated project given the desire for a gift to be made now as well as at some time in the future?

Some of the questions were answered during 2021. Inquiries were made at financial institutions known to pay a higher rate of interest on GICs than at the large, chartered banks. Unfortunately, the accounts paying higher rates of interest at these organizations were reserved for individuals and not organizations such as churches. Secondly, a review of how BMO was treating the interest earned on a maturing GIC revealed that BMO was simply including the interest earned in the new GIC. This was contrary to the directions of Parkwood but could not be reversed. Specific instructions were issued as to how to treat interest earned in the future. The accrued interest will become cash interest when the GIC next matures. Thirdly, it was decided that the annual amount to be sent to the Gifts of Change project should be \$300. The remaining questions will be addressed in 2022.

7. Reports of Ministry Teams



Dianne Nickerson Team Leader

A. Policy and Planning Team

The Policy and Planning Team (P&P) is composed of elders appointed by Session, with the Minister and Clerk of Session as *ex officio* members. P&P assists Session in the general planning and policy development on matters relating to the life and work of the congregation. As of December 31, 2021, the following are members of P&P: Dianne Nickerson, Holly MacDonald, Dennis Featherstone (*ex officio*), and Rev. James Hurd (*ex officio*).

We continue to review Terms of Reference (ToR) of the various teams with a view to updating. We have prepared a draft ToR for Historian, which will be finalized in 2022. We also reviewed the ToR for the Budget Team and Finance Team. We found the ToR for the Finance Team needed no changes. However, we found some overlap between the Budget Team and the Finance Team. We will review the Budget Team ToR in 2022 to make changes regarding overlap, as well as any other necessary amendments.

Continuing Covid 19 restrictions again hampered our abilities to deal with some ongoing issues concerning active participation in the work of our church, such as filling vacant positions on teams and other areas of concern. However, over the summer and fall, meetings with all team leaders were held which led to the creation of a Media Support Team. The team will consist of 4 subgroups [audio/visual, information technology infrastructure, website, content] which together will improve and enhance our on-line experiences. Jim MacDonald has been appointed as leader of this team.

It is to be noted that the Session's overture requesting restructuring of the national church in view of the divergent opinions on matters of human sexuality was received by the General Assembly in June 2021 and referred to the Assembly Council with direction to report to the General Assembly in 2022.

We considered referrals for study and report sent to us from the 146th General Assembly. Our responses are as follows:

With respect to edicts and preambles for ordination, induction, and admission of the minister of Word and Sacrament and of the ruling elders:

that the proposal to reword the edicts and preambles for the ordination and admission of ministers and elders not be pursued according to the present draft which is deficient because

(i) it lacks a robust affirmation of the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as the written word of God and the only rule of faith and life; (ii) it is too long; and (iii) removes a clear affirmation of allegiance to Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King.

With respect to a proposed change to the title from "Physician Assisted Suicide" to "Physician Assisted Suicide: Medical Assistance in Dying.":

that the proposal to change the title of the document "Physician Assisted Suicide" to "Physician Assisted Suicide: Medical Assistance in Dying" be affirmed but that the substance of the document not be changed but affirmed.

With respect to a proposal to delete section 8.1 re dissent:

that the proposal to change section 8.1 of The Book of Forms re the provision for dissent to be lodged by individual elders absent while attending General Assembly against actions taken by the session in their absence not be supported, but rather the provision for elders and presbyters to dissent from actions taken in their absence from any court while having expressed regrets or while on official business for any court of the church be strongly affirmed and explicitly restored to section 12.1 of the Book of Forms.

May God bless us and keep us safe.

B. Worship Co-ordination Team

We met only twice in 2021 and both times were via Zoom. Our first meeting was August 10. The purpose was to inform the WCT of the intent of Session to reopen Parkwood for in-person worship. The WCT convener had attended two prior meetings of a reopening committee of Session regarding the possibility of in-person worship.

The items considered at our August 10 meeting had to do with marking and cordoning off the pews for proper social distancing in the sanctuary. We opted for every third pew to be used which gave the required safe distancing. There were essentially 3 pew seating arrangements to be used - family which allowed up to six per pew or 2 related people at one end and a single person at the other end or 2 singles, one at each end.

Offering plates would be placed on a table at the back so that offerings could be left at the end of the service and then be retrieved by the envelope secretary. Pre-registration was required in order to attend which included the mandated questions regarding one's COVD status. A diagram of the sanctuary was also prepared by the WCT convener with the available pews marked so the ushers could properly and quickly seat attendees.

Attendees were to enter and leave the sanctuary at the rear of the sanctuary and were asked to leave the building immediately after the service.

Ceiling fans were to be left off so there would be no down draft and windows were to be opened (weather permitting) to provide circulation of air. After the service, the sanctuary had to be disinfected.

All these changes were implemented and worked well. The changes also meant revising the guidelines for the ushers.

We thank them for willingly and quickly adapting to the new requirements. Our thanks as well to Dale Tuck as team leader for Outreach who was at the front entrance every Sunday to not only greet all who came, but to also screen each attendee as to masking, vaccination status and recording everyone's temperature.

Our second meeting on November 6 was to inform the WCT that pre registration was no longer required but all other measures were still in place. The convener was to contact Pam Pestaluky and Holly MacDonald regarding Christmas decorations for the sanctuary and the Gathering Place. Our thanks to them and their elves for making both areas at Parkwood so beautiful for Advent and Christmas. Unfortunately in-person worship was canceled the week of Christmas.

The convener also recruited readers for the four Advent services plus Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. Thanks to all who willingly and gladly did the readings as requested.

The other major item on our agenda for the November 6 meeting was to consider and approve our proposed budget for 2022 which was submitted for the annual team leaders budget meeting, January 19, 2022.

2021 also saw a major overhaul of the sanctuary piano. Some much needed work was done to enhance the quality of sound and greatly extend the life of the piano. This involved replacing the tuning pins, cleaning and tightening the action screws and replacing the back catch leathers. We had to arrange for the pickup and delivery of the piano to the shop where the work was to be done plus its return once the work was complete.

2021 included a review and update to the terms of reference (TOR) for the WCT at the request of Dennis Featherstone, then clerk of Session. The convener was away at the time the request came in so Brenda Creighton graciously and capably reviewed our mandate and made the changes needed. These changes were forwarded to the convener who passed them on to the WCT members for review and comment. The amended TOR were then sent back to Dennis Featherstone. One of the major items to be included in our mandate had to do with copyright for lyrics and to arrange for yearly renewal of the CCLI license for the music Parkwood uses each week and report that usage. When requested, Dianne Smith reports the usage to CCLI in 6 month periods every two years. Brenda Creighton ensures that the music that is used each week meets the license requirements for displaying lyrics and live streaming.

Many thanks to our choir and musicians under the direction of Dianne Smith for the hymns and songs for worship and for working in an environment that required making adjustments. Thanks as well to the technical team that ensured the proper transmission of the worship service each week without fail and was constantly working to improve its quality. Slides are prepared each week which truly enhance the visual aspect of worship. Brenda Creighton works with Rev. Hurd to prepare the sermon slide each week. She also selects the images used for the offertory and special music selections. Mahshid Eshtiagh prepares the slides for the beginning of the service as well as the announcements.

We have been thankful to God that despite COVID we have been able to gather online and for a few weeks in-person for worship each week. That is through the hard work and committed efforts of many people and the grace of God to see us through. In 1 Samuel 2:30b God said - "*Those who honour me, I will honour*...." Let us continue to honour God. Soli Deo Gloria.

C. Christian Education Team

The Christian Education Team is responsible for running the church school, youth and young adult programs, Logos, short term courses of interest to the congregation, arranging Summer Mid-week Fellowship, as well as maintaining the church library.

From July 7 to August 11, six Summer Mid-week Fellowship gatherings were held outdoors on the grass at the back of the parking lot, exploring the biblical concept and theme of "Rest". Attendance varied between 6 and 15, and we were thankful for the help of our Summer Program Assistant in helping to facilitate our meetings.

Church School

With the pandemic going into its second year it is becoming more difficult to stay connected with the children and youth from a distance. This is a period of time in their lives where there are so many changes in their physical, mental and emotional growth.

At Easter time 17 families (31 children) received boxes that had various Easter/spring crafts and Easter treats. There were 7 craft ideas in each box with instructions and materials needed as well as a letter from Holly MacDonald and Pamela Pestaluky.



The older children/youth received a loot bag of candies as well as a note from us and sermon question & answers from Pastor James. 21 of these bags were delivered.

For the families with children up to Grade 6 I put together 5 church school lessons for the Easter season. 15 families (24 children) received these lessons.

I also encouraged the families to access RightNow Media for videos on the Easter story specifically "5 Minute Family Devotional" by JellyTelly and "NUA" Easter" by Sarah Campbell. A special thanks to the Parkwood delivery elves: Alta MacFie, Victoria Mabie, Kathy Newton and Susan McCullough.



Prior to the beginning of Advent Holly MacDonald and I put together 21 Advent wreaths for home use. Accompanying the wreaths were four readings that could be done, one for each Sunday of Advent, with a fifth reading for Christmas Eve. These readings corresponded with what was happening in the Sunday services.

13 families (21 children) received 6 church school lessons on the Christmas story. This was broken into two groups: kindergarten to Grade 2 and Grade 3 to Grade 6.

As with Easter, I recommended 3 different videos, for different age groups, from RightNow Media: Advent by Derwin Gray, NUA: Christmas and "Why do we call it Christmas" by Phil Vischer"

These deliveries were made possible by the following drivers: Alta MacFie, Marcia Harten, Victoria Mabie, Susan McCullough and Kathy Newton. Many thanks for taking the time to make contact with the families. Many of the drivers reported warm words of thanks and gratitude for short socially distanced visits.

Youth and Young Adults

As we entered 2021, the youth and kids' ministries at Parkwood remained virtual as we continued to walk through the pandemic together. Even with the unpredictability and uncertainty that surrounded us, God has been working through the ministries at Parkwood and in the lives of the kids and youth there. While the majority of the year of programming at Parkwood in 2021 took place online, we have been able to continue connecting in a number of ways. Through the continued closure of in-person meetings, some of the youth have begun to feel more comfortable connecting with the volunteers and myself, reaching out during various times just to talk and have someone listen to them. The youth group at Parkwood is one ministry that has continued to meet throughout the pandemic, the majority of the year being online.

The youth events usually took place on Friday evenings for a couple of hours, about twice a month. The evenings would generally consist of games, activities, a Bible study or devotional and time to connect and share what they have been doing and what's new in their lives as well as being able to connect with their church friends that most had not seen in person in quite a while. During Easter, No Other Name, the annual youth conference that takes place in Ottawa was once again held online for the youth to attend on the evening of Good Friday. The evening consisted of worship, a speaker who talked about her faith journey over the span of the evening, as well as the opportunity to engage with other youth attending the online conference.



At the beginning of the summer, we had a number of students graduating, both from grade 8 and grade 12. In order to be able to celebrate with them in the midst of the pandemic, we had socially distanced visits with the graduating students. A few of us from the Christian Education Team drove to the graduating students houses to congratulate them, hold up balloons, congratulations signs and flags, and gave each of them a graduation gift.

Over the summer, the youth events continued and were led by our summer student, Sarah. She held

four events on Zoom, having themes for each night (for example, Family Feud Night, which she included the congregation in by sending out a questionnaire for them to fill out to use for the answers in the game). Over the summer, Sarah also organized, choreographed, led and put together a music video with some of the youth to the song, "Every Move I Make".



Some of the video was filmed in the parking lot at Parkwood Church with a few people one afternoon. Other parts were filmed by some of the other youth from their homes and emailed in.

When youth group resumed at the beginning of the school year, we continued with online meetings for the month of September. At our Christian Education meeting in September, we discussed how things were going and what our options were for moving forward, and decided it was in the best interest of all to try to reopen. Our first event in October was a Thanksgiving/Harvest themed event that took place in the parking lot of Parkwood Church on the Friday evening before Thanksgiving. Fall festival and Thanksgiving themed games were played, and there was a Thanksgiving themed devotional.



COVID protocols were followed, masks were worn and distancing was maintained while outside. The next event was also an outdoor event where the youth took part in pumpkin carving, where lots of creative pumpkin designs were made that night.

In November, we began with a leaf raking event, where the youth came together on a beautiful Saturday afternoon and raked up the leaves in the church's backyard. The leaves were moved to one big pile in the yard so that they could be jumped into before being cleared away into yard waste bags. It was a great team effort between the youth and adults who came out. Many thanks to all who helped out that afternoon!



We then moved inside the Fellowship Hall for the remainder of November and December as it was getting dark early and rather cold outside. Being in the Fellowship Hall, we were able to maintain social distancing to keep everyone safe, while continuing to wear masks throughout the entirety of the event. Sanitizer and hand wipes were available as well. For these events, we did some socially distant games, as well as a scavenger hunt using scripture references to figure out the clues that led them to locations where they would find their next clue.



We had our annual Christmas party in December where there were games, gingerbread house making and other Christmas activities, such as decorating masks to make them look festive.



Throughout the year, the high school Sunday school class (grades 9-12) has continued to meet on Zoom. We have met on Sunday mornings, immediately following the worship service on Sundays from 11:15am – 12pm. We worked through a variety of curriculums found on RightNow Media, generating profound discussion and times of fellowship and connection.

In order to stay connected with the older kids and pre-teens, we held a few sessions of "Zogos" (Logos on Zoom) for grades 4-8. This took place during the winter on Wednesday evenings for roughly an hour. We met a number of times for games and a Bible discussion, allowing for the kids to come out on Zoom and spend time with their friends while being spiritually fed.

Through the challenges of being online throughout the year, there have been many blessings as relationships have grown and connections have been made with the youth. I thank everyone who has stepped in throughout this past year to support and encourage the youth ministry at Parkwood. It is a team effort and you are all a vital part of leading our youth and kids at this time in their lives, especially as we continue to navigate our way through the pandemic.

RightNow Media

A faith-based video streaming service initiated by the Christian Education Team this past year, has been a benefit to many, adults, and children alike. The Sunday School recommended videos for each age group for Christmas and Easter. The Christian Education Support Worker, Vicky Mabie, used the videos extensively for her teen Sunday School Bible lessons and her youth group discussions. During the first six months (December 2020 to June 2021), there were 32 active users and 200 interactions for a total of 50 hours. From June 2021 to December 2021 there have been 33 active users and 250 interactions for a total of 80 hours of use. The average time spent during each interaction is 20 minutes which is the time span of the average video. RightNow Media has been a valuable resource during the pandemic. On-line Course: Reformation

D. Pastoral Care Team

The members of Parkwood's Pastoral Care Team are: Rev. James Hurd, Margaret Roach, Betty Paul, Dale Tuck, Dora Brown and (LOA). Laura Game, Barbara Townsend. Rev. Hurd is chair and Dora Brown secretary. Our sympathy and prayers were extended to Barbara on the death of Duane, her husband and a member of our pastoral care team.

The team met monthly on Zoom, except in January and July. The September meeting was held in the parking lot at the church, local construction made it difficult to hear each other. At each meeting we reviewed activities in relation to the pandemic, discussed current issues and our pastoral care contacts made in person or telephone. Each meeting was opened with prayer and devotions by a team member.

We acknowledged the changes made in pastoral care following the guidelines for physical distancing, masks and sanitizing protocols. Pastoral care communion and monthly lunch and learn sessions were cancelled. Spiritual care volunteers were no longer allowed to visit patients in hospitals or Long-Term Care homes. We recognized the impact of the pandemic on our community and Long-Term Care Homes. Team members continued to make phone calls to those on our pastoral care list and other members of the congregation to keep in contact and check how they were managing. Isolation has been difficult for many residents.

We reviewed the proposed changes to the MAID legislation (medical assistance in dying) and what it will mean for the disabled and mentally ill.

Worship services at Peter D Clark Long Term Care home, Starwood Nursing Home, Crystal View Lodge and City View Retirement Residence were cancelled. Spiritual Care volunteers who had been visiting residents and helping to take residents to worship services at Peter D. Clark were suspended. Just prior to the current Coronavirus wave of Covid-19, we had restarted worship services on the resident units at Peter D. Clark. Rev. Hurd and Dora Brown attended zoom spiritual care meetings for the reopening of spiritual care at Peter D. Clark and Rev. Fair has restarted once a month service at the home.

The team reordered large-print "Today" devotional booklets to be provided to the Peter D. Clark residents and to individuals within Parkwood Church and beyond. These were mailed out by the church office. "Today" booklets were also placed by the church office in the Sunshine Room to be available for pickup by any interested persons.

The Prayer Chain, co-ordinated by Jean Elder, continued to contact prayer members weekly by email and as new prayer requests were received. This has been a busy year for Jean as several members of our congregation have asked for prayers for their loved ones.

The booklets "Journeying Through Grief" were sent to families or individuals who had suffered a loss. The booklets expressed care and support for those grieving. Barbara Townsend had coordinated the sending of the booklets. A new contact person is needed to organize and send out the booklets. The funeral services held on Zoom this past year for members of our congregation have been helpful for families and friends. Laura Game on behalf of the Pastoral Care team sent cards and notes to congregation members who had experienced a loss of a loved one, for those recovering from an illness and for special occasions.

Pastoral care visits to patients of the Presbyterian faith at the Ottawa Hospital Civic Campus and the Queensway Carleton Hospital were discontinued by the hospitals due to the pandemic. Margaret Roach and Dora Brown, who have visited patients of Presbyterian faith at the Civic Hospital campus and Queensway Carleton Hospital for at least 20 years, have resigned from visiting at the Civic Hospital campus. The Hospitals and Long Term Care continue to discontinue visiting due to the pandemic. Rev. Hurd is the Presbyterian Presbytery representative on Queensway Carleton Hospital Pastoral Care Advisory Committee.

The Ottawa Pastoral Care Training Program, part of the requirements for pastoral care and to be eligible to serve as a pastoral care visitor in hospitals, was held on Zoom. Susan McCullough and Marcia Harten completed the training program this past year. The Pastoral Care Training Program also held Spiritual Care continuing education events and advanced courses on Zoom.

We asked in the Pulse if people would be interested in attending a Lunch and Learn presentation on the web but received no replies. We encouraged more congregation members to take the Pastoral Care Training Program. Unable to meet together for worship service in church or to enjoy the social time after church service has been difficult for some. Isolation, lack of contacts and anxiety of getting the virus and/or a vaccine has impacted the physical and mental health of many in our community. The ability for us to come together on Zoom or YouTube for church service, social time or to attend meetings has been helpful for our well being.

We continue to respond to a pastoral care need if it is brought to the attention of a member of the pastoral care team. Pandemic safety measures will be followed.

Barrhaven Bible Study Group

This year was the eleventh straight year for our Bible Study. We were shut down for a few months in the spring of 2020 due to COVID but were back via Zoom by October 2020 and have been able to meet ever since thanks to Zoom.

One benefit we have experienced since we have gone on-line is that the number who are able to attend has gone up and has remained so. We could not have accommodated our present group of 24 in our basement had it not been for Zoom. The twenty four people who faithfully attend each week represent eight churches of which ten attendees come from Parkwood. Others come from as far away as Miramichi, New Brunswick. Manotick, Barrhaven, Aylmer Quebec and Kanata.

We start our study at 7:30 with prayer after a meet and greet at 7:15 and we end at 8:30 with a closing prayer. In 2021 we began with a study of Paul's letter to the Philippians. Then in the fall we began 1 Peter. Our study is based on notes that are written and distributed in advance. We review the notes which are based on each Scripture verse and then ask for comments, thoughts and questions. Martha sends out the Zoom link every week.

Outside of good verse by verse expository preaching, detailed Bible study is needed in order to grow in one's faith and knowledge of God the Father, Christ the Son and the Holy Spirit.

G. Mission Team

As a result of the COVID 19 restrictions 1 still being in place, the Mission Team decided to take advantage of the continued opportunity of using a Zoom platform as a safety measure for our meetings. We are grateful to both Rev Hurd and Asuquo Eniang who very capably act as our Zoom Meeting Hosts. The decision to have Zoom meetings has worked out very well for us. While meeting travel-time is obviously reduced to zero, meeting attendance and participation has been significantly increased. Mission Team members are normally very busy people and as a consequence, our monthly meetings are scheduled for the first Tuesday of each month, from Sept to June, starting at 7 pm and closing by 8:30 pm. Travel time and safety concerns remain significant factors for our Team Membership, many of whom come a long way to attend our meetings. With the deterrent prospect of winter weather combining with night travel darkness, the safety advantage of using Zoom technology to host our meetings becomes obvious.

We would also like to express thankful appreciation and recognition of the promotional support offered to the Mission Team

through the assistance of the Administrative Assistant - Mahshid Eshtiagh, the Events Co-ordinator - Brenda Creighton, the Pulse Editor - Carrie Morris, the Web Servant - Gord Walford, the Envelope Secretary - Betty Paul, and the Session Clerk - Dennis Featherstone. Special kudos are also expressed to Mohammed Raouf, for his unique and significant involvement with the Mission Team presentations of our Special Appeals.



3. The Mission Team is responsible to Session to bring forward community, national, and world, mission-assistance requests, to the congregation in order that all aspects of Parkwood Church's responsibilities to the world may be realized. Under our Terms of Reference, the Mission Team is directed to develop awareness of the work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in global mission and recommend ways in which Parkwood might support that work. We consider that a significant portion of our response to that mandate is being accomplished as we annually present up to 4 Special Appeals to the congregation.

In 2021, the four Special Appeals presented were:

- Feb 21, The Parkwood Church Refugee Fund: Shortly after the Special Appeal was presented, a total of \$2,239 was received in support of the Refugee Fund, part of which is deemed to have been donated in response to our Mission Team First Special Appeal.
- June 13, Christian Counseling Ottawa, \$575.00 was received in support of this ministry.

- Sept 26, The Christian Salvage Mission, \$245.00 was received in support of this ministry.
- Nov 21, Harvest House Ministries, \$350.00 was received in support of this ministry.
- 4. Operation Christmas Child Shoe Box Project:

The Operation Christmas Child Project brings joy, hope, and the message of God's love to boys and girls who are the victims of war, disease and poverty.



This year the Mission Team agreed that it would be appropriate and more inclusive to offer the opportunity of "On-Line" shoe box packing for those who experience difficulty, for one reason or another, that prevents or discourages their "hands-on" participation in our normal format. Thanks to those who participated this year, Parkwood Church was able to contribute 20 Christmas shoeboxes that were filled with toys, gifts and prayers in support of this exciting program.

5. The Christian Salvage Ministry:

While the Christian Salvage Ministry closed its doors in 2021, due to the impact of the COVID 19 Pandemic, nonetheless the ministry operation, continues as an ongoing Christian charity. This Christian ministry collects gently used Christian literature donations at their warehouse in Hamilton, Ontario. From there, the donated Christian literature is eventually distributed to Christian Churches in India and Africa where it is eagerly received. The Christian Salvage Ministry

has confirmed that they will re-establish contact with Parkwood Church when they have a new local volunteer to act as an official receiver of the donated literature.

After the meeting was opened with prayer, Leah was immediately welcomed and invited to give an update on her work in Uganda. Leah expressed appreciation for the ongoing emotional and prayer support given by Parkwood Church in partnering with her in the work in

Uganda. She shared some of her immediate plans for her return to Uganda, and following that answered individual questions from the various Mission team members. When that portion of our Feb meeting was finished a special prayer was given by the Mission Team, for Leah's safety and ongoing work on behalf of Christ's Church in Uganda. When Leah was about to leave the meeting, she mentioned that she had a couple of Prayer cards printed up. Rev Hurd encouraged her to send them to the Church Office addressed in care of Mahshid Eshtiagh, the Office Administrative assistant. I was indeed fortunate to obtain one of Leah's Picture - Prayer cards and it is now on my Home Mission Bulletin Board, in my computer room, as I am writing this note.

H. Facility Management Team

The 2020 FMT annual report began with the statement that 2020 had been a unique year for each of us. This "uniqueness" has continued throughout 2021. With in-person church services and the use of the facility for other purposes suspended in March, 2020, the tasks of facility maintenance have also been constrained. We have reduced the hours of work for the Administrative Assistant and the Caretaker; however, their efforts have been essential to maintain the worship and mission activities of Parkwood. These constraints continued throughout 2021.

While the activity levels in the building were constrained in 2021, we still had to maintain the building. While utility costs were reduced slightly, the major costs associated with the maintenance of our building systems continued. However, the following projects, which cannot be deferred indefinitely, were set aside because of budget constraints and we hope to address these starting in 2022:

- 1. The replacement of windows that are badly damaged.
- 2. Painting or cladding of the external woodwork of the building.

The Facility Management Team has identified other major maintenance projects to be addressed, such the replacement of the lighting in the Fellowship Hall, and the replacement of carpeting throughout the building, but has assigned a lower priority to these projects.

In 2021, we did complete the following projects:

- The restructuring of the IT/Media resources. The move to on-line worship was successful, largely do the efforts of Mohammed Raouf and the Media Team. At Session's request, the Facility Management Team developed a recommended Media Strategy and structure to strengthen our ability to reach beyond our physical facility electronically to fulfil the Mission of Parkwood Church. The recommendations were accepted by Session. Jim MacDonald has accepted the role of Coordinator of the Media Team and will report separately.
- The cleanup of brush and weeds on the grounds, including the removal of obsolete construction materials and accumulated "junk". We thank the volunteers o helped, particularly the youth group who held a "fall cleanup day" to clean up the property.
- The construction of an Electrical closet adjacent to the Chair Storage room in the Fellowship Hall. This was originally to be part of the last major building renovation but was deferred because of cost. We thank Dan Moffet and Marcia Harten for their efforts on this project.
- 4. A major kitchen cleanup in anticipation of reopening for worship reopening in December. This was done cooperatively by Logos, the Fellowship Group, the Facility Management Team and representatives from the Korean Congregation. This involved cleaning of the fridges and freezer and the disposal of outdated food products and washing of all dishes and linens. Then COVID intervened and we were delayed once again in reopening.

The Facility Management Team has reviewed the job performance of the Administrative Assistant and the Caretaker, and we feel that each of the incumbents are performing at a high level in the respective positions. David Joiner has indicated that he will resign from the Caretaker position in early 2022 and we have begun a process to recruit his replacement.

We appreciate the dedication of Brenda Creighton in fulfilling the role of Events Coordinator.

We appreciate the work of the Furnishings Group (see attached report), under Alta Macfie's leadership and the IT team under the leadership of Andrew MacGregor.

The Furnishing Group

The Furnishings Group received the gift of approximately 130 used black upholstered stacking chairs on dollies acquired from a government surplus auction. Along with them were twelve 5 ft. diameter round tables, four rectangular tables and four chairs with arms. There is now much more space available for storage and most of the junk has been removed. Two toilets stored there have been sold as well as a door and frame.

- Regan Rambally continues to support and troubleshoot the telephone. Note that this system is "end of life in 2022".
- Asuquo Eniang continues to program the outside electronic sign.
- Gord Walford maintains the website and provides behind the scenes support for office email.

Parkwood Church has had a presence on the world-wide web since April 1996. The site is maintained by Gord Walford. During 2021 services were livestreamed and the video recorded during the "broadcast" and archived on our YouTube channel, "Parkwood Ottawa". Production of the videos earlier in the year involved a considerable number of people, in particular Dan Moffet & Brenda Creighton, Mohammad Raouf and Gord Walford. In September when we opened up for inhouse worship, the livestream was done from the sanctuary with "live" music, under Mohammad's direction. Weekly bulletins, monthly calendars and Pulse newsletters as well as e-letters (up to Sept. 24/21) are provided by the office admin Mahshid Eshtiagh, events coordinator Brenda Creighton and the Pulse editor, Carrie Morris. News items contained in the e-letter were reintegrated with the bulletin after Sept. 24. The Pulse has reverted to mainly an online version, although a print version is available through the church office. A one-year archive of newsletters is available online. During 2021 the church added e-transfer to the ways people could donate to Parkwood, and the "donate" page was adjusted accordingly. Thanks to all who contribute.

There are some issues with the online statistics for 2021 rendering certain comparisons inaccurate. Comparisons available show number of pages visited declining 6%, number of hits increasing 10% and bandwidth used decreasing slightly. An interesting thing happens looking at pages accessed. Other than the "home" page (10,500 "hits"), the most-accessed page is one created a few years ago by Gord Walford and Alta MacFie,

of <u>Tshiluba worship songs</u> (1,700 hits - follow the link and check it out). Following that are the news (1,500 hits), contact us (1,400 hits) and the entry page set up for mobile devices such as smartphones and tablets (1,100 hits). The various iterations of the donate page have been visited 415 times.

Observations indicate that the maximum number of households watching the online service in 2021 averaged 41/week. During the 16-week period when worship was in-house, online viewing averaged 34 while those worshipping in-house and those working to produce the service etc. averaged 21; weeks when the service was livestreamed only averaged 44 live viewers. Our YouTube channel had 104 subscribers at the end of 2021, up from 70 at the end of 2020. In the four weeks prior to the writing of this report January 20, 2022 our YouTube channel had 701 views and 279.5 hours viewed.

Parkwood continues to maintain a presence on Facebook. Posts to our Facebook page tend to be links to the livestreamed services. In addition to the webservant, our minister, Christian Education Support Worker and the CE Team person who is liaison with RightNow Media have editing/posting privileges. In addition to our main Facebook page, Parkwood Youth have a presence on Facebook maintained by our CE Support Worker.

J. Finance Team

There are several volunteers who handle the various aspects of the financial affairs of Parkwood. Betty Paul is the Envelope Secretary and maintains an accounting system for donations and income received. Dianne Nickerson prepares cheques to pay non-payroll invoices. Dennis Featherstone prepares cheques to forward donations for special appeals and the donations budgeted for the Mission Team. Ugo Kejeh is the Treasurer, prepares the monthly payroll and posts all cheques to the SAGE accounting system. Kathy Newton prepares the bank reconciliation and financial statements and also makes various adjustments. Ugo then finalizes the standard monthly financial statement for use by each team and communication to the congregation by the Finance Team. Gord Walford initiated the process to make e-transfers another alternative for making donations and processes the incoming e-transfers.

Loan Repayment Fund

As shown in Table LR1, the donation to the Loan Repayment Fund in 2021 was \$8,655 somewhat less than our target of \$10,000 for the year. The total donation less the loan payment led to a decrease in the fund balance of \$1,387 bringing the total balance in the fund to \$12,545. The extra payment of \$3,000 was made, as approved at the annual meeting in February. There has been four extra payments totalling \$16,394 which decreased the loan repayment period by over two years and saved total interest payments of roughly \$10,000.

Requirements for Loan Repayments

The primary loan of \$100,000 from the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation (PCBC) is interest free for seven years, has a repayment schedule lasting 16 years, and if the congregation repays the loan by the end of the twelfth year (2027) then the interest paid will be refunded. The secondary loan of \$30,000 from the Presbytery of Ottawa requires repayment of principal and interest over a five-year period from 2023 to 2027. The individual and total required repayments are set out in Table LR2.

The interpretation of when interest payments begin requires some explanation. Parkwood arranged for a primary loan of \$65,000 in September of 2015 and an additional \$35,000 in April of 2016. The PCBC said for the interest-free period, "year one" is the first quarter of 2016 and "year seven" is the first quarter of 2022. While the first quarter of 2022 is interest free, interest will be charged for the following three quarters of the year.

Repayment Strategy

The general strategy underlying the annual targets for donations and loan repayments since repayment began has been to target annual giving of \$10,000; to try to have a year-end balance in the fund equivalent to or greater than the required payment for the following year; and to make an extra payment on the loan from time to time. As indicated earlier, extra payments have a significant effect on future repayments through reduced interest payments.

The financial repayment requirements for the retirement of the loans are set out in Table LR2. In 2022, interest on the primary loan becomes payable. The total required repayment in 2022 is \$9,873. In 2023, however, the repayment on the secondary loan begins which pushes the total loan repayment in 2023 to \$17,118. Will the donations from the congregation starting in 2023 be sufficient to meet the significant increase in repayment requirements or will there be a need for some effective fundraising?

The data in Table LR2 show the repayment of the loans will be completed in 2029, or year 14 in the repayment process. To achieve the goal of repaying the primary loan by 2027 (year 12), there will be a need for repayments above and beyond those set out in the table. A total extra payment of about \$10,000 would be required by the end of year 12 in order to get the total interest payments returned to Parkwood. The amount of interest paid and returned would depend on when the extra payments are made to complete the repayment of the loan. A working assumption is a return of \$13,000 of paid interest.

Where will the donations of the extra \$10,000 come from in order to get our interest payments returned to Parkwood? The extra payment(s) would need to be made prior to getting our interest payments returned.

Recommendation:

The congregation increase its target for donations to the Loan Repayment Fund to \$12,000 for 2022.

The committee began its review of the financial records during the fall of 2021 and will complete its review of the financial records in January and February 2022 with a report to be given at the February 2022 annual meeting.

A. Budget Team Report and Recommendations

Overview of 2021

Donations for local purposes in 2021 were \$190,158 or a little lower than for the previous year. Donations for all purposes in 2021 were roughly \$252,000 which was up a little from \$250,000 in the previous year. In addition to these financial donations, there were other major donations in 2021 including: Mohammad Raouf's donation of equipment and time for the streaming process; the donation of chairs and tables for use in Fellowship Hall; and the donation of time by Dan Moffet, Dave Joiner and Marcia Harten to renovate and finish the chair storage room and the electrical closet.

Expenditures for local purposes in 2021 were \$213,524 or a little lower than in the previous year. Some approved expenditures were not spent due to the church not being re-opened until September and parts of the youth program not being held.

There was a deficit for local purposes of about \$8,600 in 2021. At the annual meeting in February of 2021, the congregation agreed that any deficit for 2021 should be partially or completely offset with the surplus of about \$6,600 in 2020. (The surplus in 2020 was in part due to the COVID subsidy of \$13,570 from the Government.)

Goals for 2022

There continues to be major uncertainty in the timing of the re-opening for in-person worship and for general use of the church building. The basic goal when we re-open continues to be to keep Parkwood Church a desirable and safe place to worship by having sufficient staff, an attractive and safe building and support for a range of programs.

While an exact date to re-open was not used in the budget process, it was implicitly assumed we would be open more in 2022 than in 2021. On the donation side, the starting assumption for donations for local purposes was a continuation at the level of \$190,000. But the Auditor advised the team to take into consideration that there would be a "loss" of givings to Parkwood in 2022 due to expected reductions in monthly donations resulting from deaths and/or attrition of donors. The team assumed this loss to be \$10,000 for local purposes. As a result, the final assumption for givings for local purposes in 2022 was \$180,000.

For expenditures in 2022, the team was able to trim back requested total expenditures to \$210,313 which is about \$2,000 lower than actual expenditures in 2021. A major challenge in the reduction process is that wages are 68 per cent of the budget, building maintenance is 20 per cent and programs are the remaining 12 per cent.

The balance for local purposes is the difference between revenue for local purposes (givings plus rental and other income) and expenditures. For 2022, this balance is a challenging deficit of \$16,813 which can be viewed as due to the likely loss of \$10,000 in givings and a continued underlying deficit in the range of \$6,000 to \$7,000.

Budget Strategy for 2022

Session and the Budget team have developed a strategy to address the forecast deficit for 2022:

- Session is asking the congregation to make givings for local purposes to be their main focus in 2022, followed in relative importance by givings for Loan Repayment and then other funds and appeals;
- The Budget team is to begin immediately to develop ways to increase Parkwood's income; and
- 3. The Budget team is authorized by Session to begin on April 30 to restrict approved budget

expenditures if the emerging budgetary balance requires such action.

In addition to the above, there is a need to ensure an adequate balance in the Operating Fund through 2022 and at \$15,000 at the end of the year. Depending on the financial needs, there may be a need to borrow from and/or transfer money from the Mitchell-Hempstock Interest and Unallocated Interest funds. If money is needed during the course of the year, Parkwood's Investment Policy indicates that Session may "authorize the Treasurer to borrow up to \$15,000 from one or more of the reserved funds."

Clearly there are major financial challenges ahead. There may be a need to find a way to ensure a cash balance of \$15,000 at the end of 2022. Deficits must be financed from some source of funds but these funds are limited. Eventually, the source of the deficits must be addressed which will require some combination of more revenue and/or decreased expenditures. The longer we wait to address the deficit problem, the more serious the problem can become.

Recommendation #1

The Budget team recommends that the congregation approve expenditures for Local Purposes of \$210,313 for 2022 (line 22 in the table)

Recommendation #2

The Budget team recommends that the congregation approve a target for givings for Local Purposes of \$180,000 (line 1 in the table)

PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended December 31, 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

These financial statements report on the activities of Parkwood Presbyterian Church, 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario. The Church was originally established in February 1965.

The Church operates exclusively as a not-for-profit organization and as such is exempt from income tax. The Church is a registered charity.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, except for the following:

- The church building and furnishings are stated at estimated replacement value based on an insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016.
- The land is stated at nominal value as the cost is not determinable.

These statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting other than HST recoverable which is accrued at the time the expenditure to which it relates is incurred.

The following significant accounting principles have been used in preparation of these financial statements:

Revenue recognition:

Donations are recorded as revenue in the year in which they are received unless designated for a future period in which case they are deferred and taken into revenue in the period in which the related expenditure is made.

Financial instruments:

The Church's financial instruments are comprised of cash on hand and in the bank, short-term financial instruments, HST recoverable, current and long-term liabilities. All financial instruments are reported at their fair values on the statement of financial position. The fair values are the same as the carrying values due to the nature of the financial instruments. Unless disclosed elsewhere in the notes to the financial statements, it is management's opinion that the Church is not exposed to significant interest rate, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of asset and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. BUILDINGS AND FURNISHINGS

The Church building and furnishing are recorded at estimated replacement value at December 31, 2017 based on the most recent insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016. The value of the Building and Furnishings at this time was estimated at \$2,628,751. The cost of land at 10 Chesterton Drive is recorded at a nominal value of \$1.

3. SECURED LOAN PAYABLE:

Lending Fund Loan

In December 2015, the Church secured a loan of \$65,000 from the <u>Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church in</u> <u>Canada</u> (the Fund). The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015.

In July 2016, the Church secured a further advance of \$35,000 from the <u>Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church</u> <u>in Canada</u> which was also obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building, as approved at its Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016.

The Lending Fund loan is secured by a charge on the land and building at 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario.

The loan is interest free for the first 6 years, with 7% interest per annum on the outstanding balance thereafter from the 7th to the 15th year. Payments on the loan are to be made quarterly, based on a predetermined repayment schedule with interest amounts being added to the principal repayment amount beginning in the 7th year (2022). Extra payments on principal may be made at no cost, providing advance notice of the payment is provided.

The total principal repayment due in the 12 months ending December 31, 2022 is \$7,167.

Extension Fund Loan

In May 2016, the Church secured a loan of \$30,000 from the <u>Extension Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada,</u> <u>the Presbytery of Ottawa</u>. The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016.

The Loan is unsecured and repayable in full, by May 9, 2027. There will be no interest charged on or before May 9, 2022. Should any portion of the loan be outstanding as of May 10, 2022 there will be interest charged on the outstanding balance at an annual rate of interest equal to the average GIC rate of interest available from the 5 largest Canadian chartered banks.

Principal repayments of the loan are due as follows: \$6,000 due annually, on or before each of the following dates: May 9, 2023; May 9, 2024, May 9, 2025; May 9, 2026; and May 9, 2027.

4. INTERFUND TRANSFERS: During the year ended December 31, 2021 the following transfers between funds were made:

During the year a total of \$10,042 was transferred from the Loan Repayment Fund to the Operating Fund, for the purpose of principal repayments on the Secured Loan Payable.

During the year a total of \$5,000 was transferred from the Planned Giving Fund to the external Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund account currently held at BMO to be invested in accordance with the terms of reference passed by Session on June 25, 2018.

5. ENDOWMENT/PLANNED GIVING MINISTRY FUND:

The Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund is restricted and accounts for donations received where the donor requested that the principal be maintained by the Church on a permanent basis, or for a specified fixed term, with the interest earned by the invested principal to be allocated for a specific purpose approved by Session.

6. INTERNAL BORROWING:

At the Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015 a motion was approved by the congregation to borrow internally from the Organ Replacement Fund for purposes of funding the proposed building construction project. The total transferred from the Organ Replacement Fund to the Building Replacement Fund during the year ended December 31, 2016, was \$15,000.

This internal loan was made on an interest-free basis with no fixed terms of repayment.

ADDENDUM to the Audit Committee Report

Final Report of the Audit Committee – for the year ended December 31, 2021

The Parkwood Audit Committee was appointed at the February 2021 annual congregational meeting. The team consists of Kathryn Newton, Stewart Elder and Rachel McGregor.

In accordance with the team's mandate as set out in this section 170 of the <u>Book of Forms</u>, the team conducted an independent scrutiny of the records of Parkwood Church to ensure that receipts received and disbursements made are accurately recorded and documented.

The team was able to begin work in late November 2021 and was completed in early February 2022. The findings of the audit committee, based on the work performed, is that the books and records of Parkwood Presbyterian Church for 2021 appear to be in order.

The detailed findings of the audit committee will be presented to the Treasurer and the Finance Team Lead separately.

The "review" of the Planned Giving Fund records for 2021 was undertaken during this same time period and appears to be in order. Details of this review were presented to the Planned Giving Fund Managers.

We would like to extend particular appreciation to Dianne Nickerson, cheque preparer, and Betty Paul, envelope secretary, for their meticulous work in preparation of cheques, deposits and documentation supporting the weekly offering, receipts and disbursement records. Their detailed work enabled the audit committee to be most efficient in its work.

I have confirmed that Stewart Elder, Rachel McGregor and I are willing to serve as the Audit Committee for the year ending December 31, 2022.

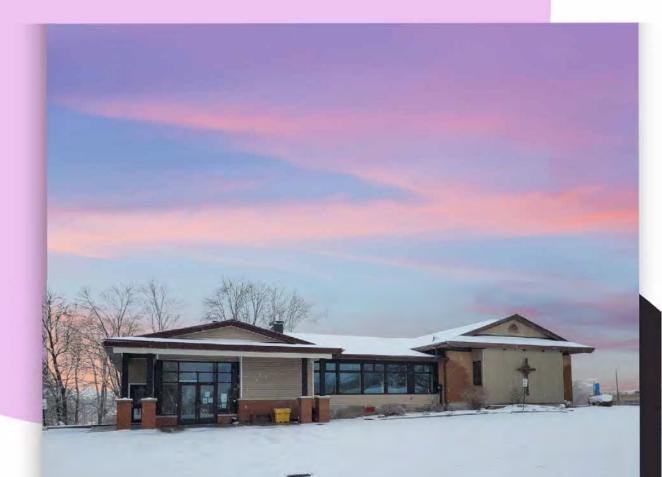

A Word from the Minister

The congregation approved expenditures for Local Purposes of \$210,313 for 2022.

The congregation approved a target for givings for Local Purposes of \$180,000.

B. Target for Presbyterians Sharing for 2022

The congregation considered a recommendation from Session to set the target for Presbyterians Sharing for the year 2022 at \$12,000. After discussion, the congregation decided not to commit to any target for the year 2022. The main reasons for this decision included apparent lack of transparency regarding how the national church uses the funds it collects from congregations for Presbyterian Sharing and fears that the national church may be using some of this funding to support issues not well aligned with or even opposed to the interests of Parkwood.

C. Appointment of Treasurer and Envelope Secretary

The congregation re-appointed Ugo Kejeh and Betty Paul as Treasurer and Envelope Secretary, respectively.

D. Appointment of Audit Team for 2022

The congregation re-appointed Kathy Newton,

Stewart Elder and Rachel McGregor as members of the Audit team.

E. Election of Trustee

A motion by Dennis Featherstone on behalf Session recommending the nomination of Jim MacFie for the position of Trustee was seconded by Dianne Nickerson. The chair called for further nominations, none were forthcoming. Jim MacFie accepted the nomination. A motion that nominations cease was made by Holly MacDonald and was seconded by John Huber and carried. The chair declared Jim MacFie elected as trustee by acclamation.

F. Membership of Ministry Teams

The congregation considered a list of members for different teams. The name of Philip MacFie was added to the Worship Coordination and name of Olivia Meyia-Takoukam was added to Media Support and on Outreach. The motion by John Fair and seconded by Don Pestaluky to approve the members was carried.

G. Other

Jean Sida's Bequest

On behalf of Session the Moderator presented two separate recommendations from Session with respect to the use of Jean Sida's bequest \$10,000 from as follows:

i) That \$1000 be designated for Gracefield Camp Christian Camp and Retreat Centre.

ii) That the balance of \$9000 be designated for the purpose of replacement of windows in the church building.

The congregation approved the two recommendations on motion of Dianne Nickerson, seconded by Don Pestaluky.

A motion of Gord Walford and seconded by Dale Tuck asking Session to consider alternatives to Presbyterian Sharing for mission donations from Parkwood was defeated.

Karen Hurd made an appeal to the congregation to support a fundraising event for Gracefield planned for 20 August 2022.

Adjournment

A motion to adjourn the annual congregation meeting advanced by Dianne Nickerson was seconded by Brenda Featherstone and carried.

A. Clerk of Session

Four main issues preoccupied session's attention on ongoing basis during the past year:

- Session spent considerable time evaluating Covid-19 measures with respect to safe reopening of Parkwood to in-person worship.
- Session devoted significant amount of time and energy at different points over the year grappling with the budget and exploring ways of bridging the projected expenditure deficit in our operating account.
- Session devoted significant attention towards supporting the establishment of the Assembly of God (Portuguese) congregation here in Ottawa.
- Session has continuously reflected and debated on the implications for Parkwood of the General Assembly's changes effected by Remit B and C.

Session's work on Covid-19 measures includes:

- Regular review of public health mandates from the Provincial Government and the City of Ottawa and communicating them to the congregation through various channels including posters, the Bulletin, and the Pulse.
- Exercising its discretion with respect to lifting of Covid-19 measures and making recommendations to the congregation correspondent with the health needs of Parkwood members.
- Re-designating pew sitting and space in the sanctuary for safe in-person worship consistent with public health mandates.

Session's work on Parkwood's operating budget included:

- Review and approval of stewardship letter appealing for increased giving by members of the congregation.
- Placing announcements in the bulletin and making verbal appeal for more support during worship.

• Review and approval of a proposal from the Budget team for a fundraiser.

Sessions work on supporting AG (Portuguese) included:

- Review and approval of terms of reference for renting the church building.
- Delegating authority to relevant teams to ensure that support systems needed for the AG (Portuguese) conduct service of worship are in place.
- Communicating to the congregation about the presence of AG (Portuguese) in our midst and the need to make them feel welcome at Parkwood.

Session's work concerning changes to Remits B and C included:

- Meetings with members of session from Grace Orleans, St. Paul's, and Knox Manotick to learn from each other and for mutual support.
- Review of the communique prepared by Rev. James Hurd to the congregation on Remit B and C.
- Make plans to convene a separate congregational meeting to hear the views of members of Parkwood about changes to Remit B and C.

Other activities:

- Complied minutes of the annual congregational meeting convened in February 2022.
- Prepared and submitted the 2022 Canada Summer Jobs application for Summer Program Assistant position at Parkwood.
- Reviewed the visitation report compiled by the delegates sent by the Presbytery of Ottawa to Parkwood.
- Appointed a force to design an outreach strategy for Parkwood.
- Reviewed and approved terms of reference for Worship Coordination and Security Guidelines for the church building.
- Approved the offer of loan of grand piano.
- Approved the baptism of Keegan Meyia-Takoukam and Alexandra Meyia-Takoukam.
- As clerk, I attended two presbytery meetings on behalf of Representative Elder in March and Mav 2022.

D. Representative Elder

The Presbytery of Ottawa consists of twenty churches and one mission work, the Jesus the Only Way Arabic Evangelical Mission, which began in 2015 as an initiative of Grace Church Orleans. In the fall of 2022 Presbytery was informed that the church plant in Rockland was likely to be ceasing regular worship services by the end of the year. The Presbytery in partnership with the Presbytery of Seaway-Glengarry employed a part-time Ministry Animator, Cheryl Gaver, up to Cheryl's passing in April 2022; a process of discernment is currently taking place regarding the future of the position. The presbytery also oversees the operation of Gracefield camp through a Board of Directors. 2022 saw no departures or inductions and one retirement:, one minister continues as stated supply - Ruth Draffin at Rockland

Community Church. Three churches are vacant: St. Andrew's Aylmer (operating under a long-term supply arrangement), St. Martin's & St. David's, and Trinity Carp, into which a new minister was inducted on January 8, 2023. The presbytery met seven times in 2022.

I serve the Synod of Eastern Ontario as the convener of the Finance Committee and as such am a member of Synod Council. The Synod consists of five Presbyteries: Quebec, Montreal, Seaway-Glengarry, Ottawa and Lanark-Renfrew. Synod Council met twice in 2022, in April and September, via Zoom; Synod met in October. James also sits on Synod Council, as clerk of our presbytery.

Our minister is the Presbytery Clerk; the Moderator is Jonathan Dent, minister at Grace Church, Orleans. A number of Parkwood people sit on Presbytery committees.

It has been an honour and a privilege to represent Parkwood at Presbytery and Synod this past year. The Presbyterian Church in Canada continues to face considerable challenges, especially navigating through the issue of human sexuality. General Assembly in June 2021 adopted two contentious remits that threaten the future of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as we know it. By the time the Annual Meeting takes place, two meetings will have taken place outlining options for Parkwood going forward.

I. Planned Giving Ministry

In 2022, there was a donation of \$5,000 to the Planned Giving Ministry. The donation was transferred to the separate bank account for the Planned Giving Ministry at BMO. As of the end of 2022, a total of \$34,000 has been donated to the Planned Giving Ministry.

There were three goals in 2022. First, clarifications of our preferences were successfully communicated to BMO, including BMO putting the interest earned from maturing GICs into our bank account rather than wrapping them into a renewal GIC and ensuring that we have the lowest cost bank account. Second, electronic access to our bank account was established which means that Parkwood can minimize the bank fees being charged and will enable e-transfers when earned interest is donated to charitable projects such as Gifts of Change.

The third goal was to take advantage of the rising trend in interest rates for GICs. Maturing GICs and the new donation were pooled into an investment late in 2022 at a GIC rate of 4.25 per cent per annum.

The team continues to prepare a detailed tracking of the several GICs which make up the investment portfolio. With the exception of \$100 kept in the bank account, the remainder of the total-to-date donations of \$34,000 is invested. The cash balance as of December 31 is \$552.42. In 2023, some of the cash balance will be distributed to the Gifts of Change project.

A. Policy and Planning Team

The Policy and Planning Team (P&P) is composed of elders appointed by Session, with the Minister and Clerk of Session as ex officio members. P&P assists Session in the general planning and policy development on matters relating to the life and work of the congregation.

As of December 31, 2022, the following are members of P&P: Dianne Nickerson, Holly MacDonald, Dennis Featherstone, Paul Mkandawire (*ex officio*), and Rev. James Hurd (*ex officio*).

Our team did a considerable amount of work reviewing, creating, overseeing, and updating terms of reference for various teams and personnel including, the following: Finance Team, Budget Team, Worship Co-ordination Team, Historian, Media Support Team, Trustees. Input from team members was very helpful and much appreciated – thank you.

We continue to search for someone who would be willing to accept the position of Historian. This is one job that does not have deadlines! Simply gathering information for our history book and writing it down for future generations can be very interesting and rewarding. Please prayerfully consider this as one way you can serve God's church at Parkwood by contacting any member of Policy and Planning as listed above.

Parkwood is overdue to have its important records transferred to microfilm. To that end we investigated through the head office of the Presbyterian Church in Canada as to what records they have on file for us, as well as current costs for microfilming. In order to save money, Rev. Hurd usually transports the material to Toronto "the next time he is going there". Needless to say, during Covid, this has not happened, giving P&P more time to look into what needs to be sent. Because of our current finances due to Covid, it has been decided to budget for this endeavour in 2024. In the meantime, P&P will be asking team leaders to begin organizing their material before the fall, so that we can calculate the costs for inclusion in the budget for 2024. The leaders will receive an e-mail shortly from P&P in this regard.

The cost of Parkwood's insurance has increased, and we have been discussing issues regarding cost, as well as other matters, with our insurer. This has been very time-consuming and frustrating because we do not seem to be receiving answers to our questions from the appropriate people. This is a work in progress for 2023.

New policies are being worked on regarding the possibility of secure external access to electronic data, especially in these times of remote working, and other remote activities. Also, we continue to consider future goals and strategies for growth, participation, outreach, rentals, etc.

B. Worship Co-ordination Team

The year 2022 was a busy year for the Worship Coordination Team (WCT). One of our responsibilities involves the Lenten and Easter Services plus the Sunrise service. At a Zoom meeting of the WCT and Fellowship Teams, we were able to organize both the services and the following breakfast.

Ed and Vicki Steenhorst and Carolyn Herbert were willing recruits to do all the breakfast preparation. We were so grateful for their help in putting on the breakfast.

In 2021 Policy and Planning commenced work on reviewing the Terms of Reference for the WCT. That work continued into 2022 with further input from the WCT. The final version was issued by Session on September 26, 2022 and is available on the Parkwood website.

WCT does a regular check to ensure that the prayer request card, welcome card and visitor offering envelope are available in each pew on any given Sunday.

One of the major duties of WCT is ushering. Before the end of each year a fresh roster is sent out to the ushers. Currently we have six teams, and a total of twelve people that graciously serve on their appointed Sunday. Ushering tasks begin by turning on the lights in the Gathering Place and the Sanctuary.

They then bring out the Pulpit Bible, the bulletins for the service, the offering plate and the reserve signs for the ushers on the back pew. One of the ushers places the Bible on the pulpit and marks the Scripture texts for the reader. The ushers are then ready to greet all who come, especially visitors and ensure that all receive a bulletin. They are always there to provide assistance in any way before, during and after the service. During the singing of the last hymn, an usher retrieves the Bible from the front of the Sanctuary and precedes the minister down the center aisle after the Benediction.

We welcomed Ruth Ibelegbu and Barbara Kondric to the roster of ushers in 2022 and now for 2023 and thank them for their willingness to serve. We would welcome others to come and join in this work. Think of yourself as a doorkeeper in the house of the Lord. Psalm 84:10.

One of the major events that needed our attention in 2022 was the acquisition of a grand piano for the sanctuary. Parkwood had received the offer of a loan of a grand piano for an indefinite period of time. The offer was first referred to the WCT for comment and recommendation back to Session. However, our opinions were split and so our comments were sent back to Session without recommendation. Session went ahead and approved the piano being brought to Parkwood.

It has enhanced worship and the appearance of the sanctuary. It has also led to trying new arrangements for the pulpit, lectern and choir. On October 2, 2022 there was a joint meeting of the WCT with the Media Support Team and Christian Education. The purpose was to offer suggestions on how to use the space at the front of the Sanctuary in relation to the placement of the grand piano. The WCT wrote a report to Session with the ideas expressed by the participants. Things have yet to be determined as to a final arrangement. Parkwood is grateful for the piano.

We thank Holly MacDonald and Pam Pestaluky and their two elves who decorated the Gathering Place and the Sanctuary for Advent and Christmas. Thank you as well for those who volunteered and read Scripture at Advent and Christmas plus those who read each week as part of the worship service. This provides an opportunity for the laity and the youth to participate in the worship service.

Our thanks to Susanne and Ted Johnson for providing the decorations for Thanksgiving. Thank you to the Audio Visual Group of the Media Support Team who provide the technical expertise for the weekly broadcast of the Sunday worship service and those who prepare the bulletin and

the slides each week. Thank you as well to Dianne Smith and the choir for their weekly work supplying music and song for worship. Much goes on behind the scenes to ensure that we honour the Lord God which is our ultimate goal.

Youth and Young Adults

The year 2022 remained to be a time of changes and adjustments in the youth ministry at Parkwood. Throughout 2020 and 2021, we had adapted to switching primarily to online ministry, having youth events and high school Sunday school classes over Zoom. After reopening in person for youth group for a couple months at the end of 2021, everything shifted back to online just before Christmas, which meant, we were back to online youth group at the beginning of 2022.

We continued meeting virtually every second week, generally on Friday nights for a couple hours to play games and have a Bible lesson and discussion. Those who came out still enjoyed being able to connect with their friends despite not being able to see them in person. Thankfully, this period of going back to online only lasted a couple months.

By late winter, we were easing back to being in person once again, holding our meetings in the Fellowship Hall where we had plenty of space to keep distance between ourselves while still wearing masks to keep each other safe. As we adjusted to being in person again while knowing COVID-19 was still around us, we were able to figure out a way to once again run the youth ministry at Parkwood in person while maintaining health protocols and keeping each other safe.

In April, the Parkwood youth group attended No Other Name, the annual youth conference that takes place on Good Friday. This was the first year that No Other Name met in person in three years due to the pandemic. At their new location, Cedarview Alliance Church, a large number of youth groups from across the city met that afternoon and evening for times of worship, speakers, discussions, games, and so much more.



Everyone was so excited to be back in person, getting to reconnect with their friends and make new ones. Parkwood had nine youth and two leaders attend.

We continued to meet throughout the spring for events, including in-person game nights, an afternoon water balloon fight, bowling and an endof-school-year BBQ. The number of youths who came out tended to fluctuate, but overall, there was a gradual increase as we continued to learn how to do youth group in a "post-lockdown" world.



Throughout July and August, our summer student, Violet Busat, ran our youth events. She led the youth in a rock painting night where they could paint rocks with inspirational words or sayings, cute pictures or anything else that might brighten someone's day when they saw it in a garden. She held another event where she led them through a virtual escape room that focused on Nehemiah. This had them working as a team through a number of puzzles that went along with the story of Nehemiah and the rebuilding of the wall.

We began our regular bi-weekly youth meetings again in September, starting up with a games and devotional night at the church. We met later that month for outdoor mini putt at Mini Golf Gardens, enjoying one of the last "good weather" nights before it got too cold. We had a couple of other games and devotional nights at the church throughout the fall. We also met with the youth group from Knox Presbyterian Church Manotick on two separate occasions, for a night of games and learning to cook and bake. In October, the family

ministries coordinator from Knox led the group in baking red velvet cupcakes. In December, the two groups joined together to put together a spaghetti dinner. Both evenings were a time of good fellowship, witnessing the youth from Parkwood connect with kids and teens from another church.



Our final youth event before Christmas was our annual Christmas party. Due to the nasty winter weather we ended up moving the party to the Sunday before Christmas, following the church service. We had a good turnout, even having a couple of youth join us who are usually unable to join on our regular youth group meeting nights. We all enjoyed a fun afternoon of a taco lunch, a Christmas devotional, ugly Christmas sweater cookie decorating, and a gift exchange.

We have a wonderful team of helpers working with the youth on Friday nights, made up of Philip MacFie, Derek Newton, and Violet Busat. They have connected well with the youth and are a blessing to this ministry and all who are involved. We are all very thankful for their help on Friday nights and their guidance and love for the youth.

The high school Sunday school class had remained online throughout 2021 and continued in the same manner at the beginning of 2022. Numbers were consistent but low, and eventually we found there were a number of weeks where no youth came to the online class. As restrictions eased, we decided to try going back in person, but as a hybrid model – meeting in person, but still offering a virtual component. We had been meeting at 11:15 a.m. on Zoom, following the Sunday morning worship service. Once we began to meet in person again, the youth requested to have the time of the class go back to the regular time slot of during the worship service. This encouraged more youth to attend, and attendance began to increase again. The hybrid model was offered until late spring, but eventually stopped as none were attending virtually anymore. We also welcomed the grade 8's into the high school class as we moved into the hybrid model.

We worked through a curriculum from RightNow Media, and other individual lessons on various topics they face in day-to-day life. We worked through Easter lessons during the Lenten season, focusing on Jesus' life, death and resurrection. After Easter, we moved into a curriculum from Fuller Institute called Faith in an Anxious World. This looked at stresses that teens today face and how to deal with them in a constructive way instead of turning to coping mechanisms that are not helpful and are possibly more damaging. We got through a couple of lessons before the summer, took a break over July and August, and then picked up where we left off in September. We wrapped up this material near the end of October.



A few individual topics were covered in the weeks leading up to Advent, where we then began a fourweek Advent curriculum from Ministry to Youth called The Arrival. This looked at different parts of the Christmas story that don't often receive as much attention, such as the history of Advent, the prophets, the obedience from Mary and Joseph, and the responses from the Magi and King Herod. It was a busy but exciting year as we adjusted to being back in person, learning how to run youth ministry again in a very different world than where we were before covid shut things down three years ago. A lot of the youth have moved into the youth group age and it is exciting to work with them and see them growing and developing into wonderful young people.

Thank you to everyone who has helped with the youth ministry this year. It takes a village to run a youth ministry and Parkwood has a wonderful group helping to guide our teens. You are all a blessing to the youth and to myself.

D. Pastoral Care Team

The members of Parkwood's Pastoral Care Team were Rev. James Hurd, Margaret Roach, Betty Paul, Dale Tuck, Marcia Harten, Dora Brown and on (LOA). Laura Game, Barbara Townsend. Rev. Hurd is chair and Dora Brown secretary.

The team met monthly on Zoom, except in July and August. Each meeting was opened with prayer and devotions by a team member. We reviewed and discussed activities in relation to the pandemic and other issues arising from pastoral care team visits in person or telephone.

Team members responded to referrals, make phone calls to those on our pastoral care list and other members of the congregation to keep in contact and check how they were managing. Pastoral care communion and monthly lunch and learn sessions were cancelled. Spiritual care volunteers were not allowed to visit patients in hospitals or Nursing homes and only recently started limit visitation. In November 2022 we held the first lunch and learn since the beginning of the pandemic. The impact of the pandemic on our community, hospitals, and Nursing Homes was at times overwhelming for those who had a family member ill. Team members continued to respond to a pastoral care need if it was brought to the attention of a member of the pastoral care team. Issues and concerns that were brought to the attention of Parkwood's Pastoral Care Team were discussed and dealt with according to our recourses, information, and knowledge.

Worship services at Starwood Nursing Home, Crystal View Lodge and City View Retirement Residence were cancelled. Worship services at Peter D. Clark were cancelled and Spiritual Care volunteers who had been visiting residents and helping at the Home were suspended. We cautiously restarted worship services at Peter D. Clark. Rev. Fair has restarted conducting once a month service at the home. Dora Brown continues to help by contacting pastors and communicating with the home by telephone and email for resident worship services. We were often short of pastors to conduct the services or visit residents. The Spiritual Care Team of Peter D. Clark held regular spiritual care meetings by Zoom during the pandemic. Rev. Hurd and Dora Brown attended these meetings.

Finding ways to provide media to members, especially those in hospital or Nursing homes, to enable contact or connection to the church services was one of the issues brought to our attention. Some did not have computers, iPads or phones, were unable to use them or had no connection to the internet. Cost or technical ability remains a problem for some. Dale Tuck continues to follow up on these issues. The Nursing Home Spiritual Care committee reported that TV/you tube church services were provided to Nursing Home residents by use of iPads and help of staff. Transportation for those unable to take Para Transpo or drive a car to come to church service were discussed and a notice placed in the church bulletin. This still remains an issue. A concern was voiced about the impact of telephone calls or media giving wrong information or making false statements. This will be addressed in a future lunch and learn. Dale Tuck brought to our attention that some members of our congregation had difficulty paying for their medications. We established that a referral could be made to the

local Community Resource Centre or contacting the Ontario Trillium Drug Program.

Pastoral Care has in their budget the large print "Today" devotional booklets provided to the Peter D. Clark residents and to individuals within Parkwood Church and beyond. These were mailed out by the church office and delivered by Betty Paul to the Nursing Home. Booklets were also made available by the church office for pickup by any interested person.

The Prayer Chain, co-ordinated by Jean Elder, continued to contact prayer members weekly by email and as new prayer requests were received. Once again this has been a busy year for Jean as several members of our congregation have asked for prayers for their loved ones.

2022 was another busy year for people requesting prayer for loved ones. 554 prayer requests were received and we had 86 people giving thanks for answered prayer.

If you feel drawn to pray for people we would love to have you join the prayer team.

The booklets "Journeying Through Grief" were sent to families or individuals who had suffered a loss. The booklets expressed care and support for those grieving. Margaret Roach is the contact person to organize and send out the booklets. Laura Game on behalf of the Pastoral Care team sent cards and notes to congregation members who had experienced a loss of a loved one, suffered an illness or experienced a special event.

Pastoral care visits to patients of the Presbyterian faith at the Ottawa Hospital Civic Campus and Queensway Carton Hospital were suspended. Rev. Hurd is the Presbyterian Presbytery representative on Queensway Carleton Hospital Pastoral Care Advisory Committee and will advise us about future pastoral care visits to the hospital.

Unable to meet for worship service in church or to enjoy the social time after church service limited the ability to connect with each other and to meet new members of the church. Isolation, lack of contacts and anxiety of getting the vaccine or Covid continued to impact the physical and mental health of many.

The ability for people to come together on you-tube for church service and Zoom for social time, attend meetings and make contacts was helpful to maintain our connection and spiritual, mental well being.

Through out 2022, it was difficult to contact people and to do follow up. Changes were constantly being made in pastoral care due to the pandemic and following the guidelines for physical distancing, masks, sanitizing protocols and isolation.

The Ottawa Pastoral Care Training Program, part of the requirements for pastoral care and to serve as a pastoral care visitor in hospitals, was held on Zoom. The Ottawa Pastoral Care Training Program also held Spiritual Care continuing education events and advanced courses on Zoom. We encouraged more congregation members to take the Pastoral Care Training Program.

Barrhaven Bible Study Group

The year 2022 was the twelfth year for the Barrhaven Bible Study Group which began January 16, 2011. We met in our basement until COVID hit in the spring of 2020 but we were back in operation by the fall of 2020. We were different in two ways. One, we could no longer meet in person as we had done and so ZOOM became the means by which we were able to continue. Second difference, thanks to ZOOM, our group expanded in number and that growth continued in 2022 and already in 2023. We are indeed thankful to God for the new folk who have joined us and for those who have remained faithfully with us, some since we began.

We study various books of the Bible and topics suggested by participants. Study notes are distributed in advance; we go through the Scripture text and then have discussion and questions.

In going back through our notes for 2022 we realized how much study we actually did in that year. We concluded our 2021 study of 2 Peter and then went on to Titus and from there a brief study of Heaven. Before we broke for the summer we spent some time in Philemon.

We began the fall session with a few weeks of study of Christian doctrine. We began by defining what doctrine is, the history of doctrine, how it came to us, plus how it is linked to theology. The apostolic period, AD30-90 produced the New Testament consisting of the four gospels and the epistles, particularly of Paul and John and the writer to the Hebrews. The New Testament has given us rich doctrine from the rich theology of its inspired writers. The Reformation and the Reformers beginning in the 16th century brought the church back to the Scriptures and thus to its doctrinal teaching and theology through the public preaching of the word in the language of the people, plus the writing of much commentary on the New Testament.

We studied the doctrine of God, the doctrine of the Trinity, the Five Doctrines of Grace or Five Points of Calvinism and the Five Solas of the Reformation. We finished with a quote from John Calvin, 1509-1564, when he said – "Doctrine is the soul of the Church for quickening." Doctrine and theology which belong together are therefore to be valued and taught.

After that we began a study of 1 John. This has

proven to be a rich study of the inspired work of that gospel writer. John constantly challenges his readers of the first century AD church and those of the twenty first century AD church to test the genuineness of their conversion and as Peter challenged his readers in 2 Peter 1:10 to make their calling and election sure. As we enter 2023, we are about halfway through 1 John. Come and join us – there is room on Zoom.

We would like to express appreciation to the congregation for the generous response in prayer and funding offered in support of the projects and appeals brought forward by the Mission Team throughout the year.

In 2022, the Four Mandated Special Appeals were:

- The March 27, Appeal in support of the "Jesus the only Way Evangelical Arabic Ministry", through which \$575 was received.
- The June 12, " Sat 7 Canada" ministry, Appeal received \$300 in support.
- The 25 September, Appeal given on behalf of the Algonquin College Campus Ministry, received \$508 in support.
- The 20 November, Wycliffe Bible Translators, Appeal received a Total of \$355 in support.

In addition, to our mandated, Four Mission Team Special Appeals each year, the Mission Team brought forward before the congregation, a Special Appeal, on behalf of the Presbyterian Church in Canada's support request with respect to the crisis in Ukraine. As a result, \$1,575 was received On behalf of our Parkwood Church congregation in support of this additional special appeal.

Operation Christmas Child:

In 2022, 30 prayerfully packed shoeboxes, each one

a tangible expression of God's love and an opportunity to show the Good News of Jesus Christ with a child, their family, and community, were presented as Christmas gift donations at Parkwood Church in support of the 2022 Christmas Child Shoebox program. This Samaritan's Purse project, which started in 1993, in 2023 celebrated the collection and distribution of their 200 millionth Christmas Child Shoebox. The Mission Team would like to thank all those who assisted in this year's project through their prayer, financial support and the packing and filling of the Christmas Shoeboxes.



The Christian Salvage Ministry:

For a long time now, the Parkwood Mission Team has collected and sent Christian material to Christian Salvage in Hamilton, On, through local Ottawa area volunteers. CSM normally distributes these donations to various Christian churches, missions and ministry communities in Africa and India, where they are eagerly received. However, since CSM no longer has a collection depot here in Ottawa, they are hopeful that if we can collect a normal pallet-sized load, they will be able to arrange for a truck company to pick the pallet up and deliver it free of charge to their warehouse in Hamilton. Consequently, the Christian Salvage Ministry Collection Box has been placed once again in the Church Gathering Place Coat-Room and the congregation is now encouraged to once again donate their slightly used Christian literature to it. It is hoped that when sufficient material is received appropriate transportation to Hamilton, arrangements can be successfully concluded.

H. Facility Management Team

During 2022 FMT saw the loosening of Covid restrictions and the return of some activities into the church. It also saw turnover in both the Administrative Assistant and Caretaker positions and major storm damage to the Church building and property- in all a challenging year. Everyone has been happy to return to in-person worship and to the ability to meet together as Teams and as a Congregation. At the same time, some people are cautious about meeting in person and many of us enjoy the convenience of meeting electronically and remotely. The combination has presented both opportunities and challenges.

In June 2022, David Joiner, who had served as caretaker for several years, retired. In September, Mahshid Eshtiagh resigned as Administrative Assistant to move to a challenging management position that will utilize her skills and abilities; we wish both David and Mahshid well. We have been fortunate to recruit Sunkyu Kim to the position of caretaker as our needs fit well with his schedule as a student at the University of Ottawa. Also, in September, we were pleased to have Elizabeth Mabie join as Administrative Assistant.

In mid-year, Ottawa was struck by a major wind and rainstorm that did significant damage across the city, and indeed across the Ottawa Valley. At Parkwood, we had several trees blown down and the wind did significant damage to the property and also to the building, breaking windows and damaging our roof. Thanks to the effort of many volunteers we were able to clear the debris strewn on the property relatively quickly. Because of supply chain issues that have made it difficult for anyone to access construction and other materials, and because of the shortage of workers to do the repairs, it took five months to complete the recovery. However, in the process we replaced the shingles on our roof under our insurance coverage.

In past reports we have noted the need to replace several windows in the Sanctuary, the Administrative office area and the Meeting Room. As a result of a generous donation we were able to replace these windows in November.

As we study our building, there are other projects that will require attention in the short term future:

- The repair/replacement of soffits, fascia and eavestroughs for the building;
- The painting or covering of wood surfaces on the exterior of the building;
- The replacement of tile and carpet flooring in several areas of the building; and
- The replacement of ballasts and light fixtures in areas such as the Fellowship Hall.
- The installation of a backflow tank on our sewer system, as required by the City of Ottawa- in 2023.

As we have a large building, it is certain that other capital repair priorities will be added to the list.

The operating budget of the Facility Management Team in 2022 was \$58,706. If you remove, that salary and insurance costs budgeted at \$24700, that leaves\$34,000 to operate our facility. This includes \$9,000 for snow removal and yard maintenance, and \$11,000 for utilities. The remainder of the budget is sufficient only to cover minor maintenance of problems that arise. We need to plan for significant capital or maintenance costs to protect our investment in our Church building.

We appreciate the dedication of Brenda Creighton in fulfilling the role of Events Coordinator.

We also appreciate the work of the Furnishings Group, under Alta Macfie's leadership.

As Team Leader, I want to also express my appreciation for the dedication, effort and support of the Team members- Alta and Jim McFie, Dale Tuck, Jim Elder. Marcia Harten and Martha Fair. At the same time I want to extend an invitation to other members of the Congregation to join our team and contribute your skills and effort to help maintain and improve our Church Building.

Events

2022 proved to be a year of returning to a new scheduling of groups and meetings hosted at the church or on Zoom. I continue to schedule all of the regular Parkwood groups and meetings hosted on Zoom so we can ensure that there is someone who can run the meeting and that there isn't an overlap as we only have one Zoom subscription. The office sets up the Zoom invitations and sends them out to the person hosting a meeting.

We continue to provide space for the Ottawa Korean Presbyterian Church (OKPC) who meet on Sunday afternoons for worship and other times during the week. We have also welcomed the Ottawa branch of the Assembly of God who meet for worship on Sunday evenings and another Saturday evening each month.

Beginning in August, we welcomed Recovery on the Hill (a new AA group) on Thursday evenings. There were a few rentals from groups who had rented before Covid and were ready to meet in person again.

There are many smaller churches in the Ottawa area looking for space to meet. Most requests are for Sunday which are politely refused as our building is full on Sundays. Some requests have just too many attendees for us to accommodate. Each request is considered according to Parkwood's guidelines and not all inquiries result in a rental. Use of the Sanctuary requires approval from the minister and perhaps Session, depending on the circumstances.

With the replacement of the chairs and 12 new round tables, Gord Walford took new pictures for the website. Dan Moffet created new layout plans for the Fellowship Hall to include the 12 tables and chairs. We are only able to accommodate 96 attendees and still allow space for serving tables and adequate circulation. A lot of time was spent in December to find a company who would provide liability insurance for groups who rent our building. Parkwood's insurer no longer provides insurance for church events in a timely manner.

Parkwood Church Activities appear on a calendar in the Gathering Place, on the website and on the back page of the Pulse. All booked uses of the building appear on the **Parkwood Events** calendars in the Volunteer Room. They are updated weekly.

Parkwood Events calendars are emailed to team leads and other affected people.

As we have a part time caretaker and many events occur on the weekend, it is appreciated when people clean up after their meetings and return tables and chairs to their regular arrangement. I couldn't do this work without the support of our caretakers, Dave Joiner who retired in May, and Sunkyu Kim who has taken on the challenge.

And finally, thanks to Dennis Featherstone, Paul Mkandawire and Pastor James for their continued guidance.

I. Media Support Team

The Media Support Team was formed late 2021 with Jim MacDonald as the Team Leader. The purpose of the Media Support Team is to facilitate the development and implementation of a media plan or strategy to support and encourage all ministry teams (Worship Co-ordination, Christian Education, Fellowship, Mission, Outreach, Pastoral Care, Facility Management, and Finance) and the congregation as a whole to reach out, using audio-visual technologies, to the congregation and the broader community to achieve the mission of Parkwood Church.

The Support Groups will include:

- 1. The Audio-Visual Support Group
- 2. The IT Support Group
- 3. The Website Support Group
- 4. The Content Support Group

The following are the reports from the Support Groups:

Audio Visual Group

Much foundational work has been done by Mohammad Raouf to improve and upgrade the audio-visual (AV) equipment and its performance. The purpose of this work is to promote the spread of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Mohammad Raouf, Jim MacDonald and Violet Busat have been running the Sunday morning live streaming. Joelle Hanna, Samantha Sutherland, Alta MacFie, Tony Abou Kasem, Gerald and Rhoda Reid ran the power point. We are thankful for their service in the worship of our Lord.

During the past year, there were 960 views of the Parkwood church services streamed live at 10:00 am Sunday morning. However over 2,400 people accessed the YouTube channel recording after the 10:00 am worship service.

The Audio-Visual group has prepared a list of Parkwood's audio-visual capabilities. These are available to Parkwood's ministry Teams as well as to renters of the church. Mohammad has been instrumental in teaching some of these capabilities to the office administrator and to renters.

People today, especially the newer generation are very dependent on the use of applications such as Facebook, Instagram, YouTube, etc. Our presence in these places is a way to promote Christianity. Any ideas you have for making short videos or music recordings are welcome. Any ideas or requests for help in promoting events or messages by the ministry teams at Parkwood are also welcome.

IT Support Group

Members of the IT Team are Brenda Creighton, Asuquo Eniang, Jim MacDonald, Regan Rambally and Gord Walford.

This year we worked on the following:

• Installed upgrades to the Windows operating systems on all computers and laptops.

- Installed new versions of the Church Windows software which is used in the office to prepare documents like the Congregational Directory and the Christmas and Easter letters.
- Brenda did Norton antivirus and Windows updates and backups of the network which are stored offsite. The Admin did backups of the Admin computer.
- Brenda prepared a laptop for the Summer Programs Assistant so she could work offsite.
- Brenda prepared the computer environment for the new Church Administrative Assistant.
- Asuquo provided a File Server to allow for more effective sharing of files between staff.
- Asuquo solved networking problems.
- Attempts were made to speed up the volunteer computer by adding additional RAM memory and updating the hard drive. Unfortunately, no improvements can be realized.
- Provided support for all IT related issues encountered at the church.
- Unused Bell e-mail accounts were deleted to realize some savings on our monthly bill.
- Regan continues to support and troubleshoot the telephone system (FortiVoice). Note that this system is "end of life in 2022".
- Asuquo continues to program the outside electronic sign.
- Gord maintains the website with Asuquo's support and provides behind the scenes support for office email.

Parkwood church has had a presence on the worldwide web since April 1996. The site is maintained by Gord Walford. While in-person worship was suspended from Christmas 2021 through the end of February 2022, services were livestreamed and the video recorded during the "broadcast" and archived on our YouTube channel, "Parkwood Ottawa" with one exception: the day after the "derecho" hit on May 21/22, an in-person worship service was held in a church without power. Although the power was not restored in the neighbourhood for over a week, the next Sunday's service was recorded and broadcast after-the-fact. – so recordings of services are available for the entire year except for one Sunday. Thanks to Mohammad Raouf and his team of volunteers. Weekly bulletins, monthly calendars and Pulse newsletters are provided by the office admin Elizabeth Mabie, events coordinator Brenda Creighton and the Pulse editor, Carrie Morris. We continue to publish the monthly Pulse newsletter (including summer months when the printed edition goes on vacation). A one-year archive of newsletters is available on the website.

There are some issues with the online statistics for 2022 rendering certain comparisons inaccurate. Comparisons available show number of pages visited declining 6%, number of hits down 3% and bandwidth down 7%. Looking at pages accessed, other than the "home" page (9,916 "hits"), most-accessed page is the contact-us page (1,882 "hits"), followed by the news page (1,877). Next in is the page of Tshiluba worship songs (created a few years ago by Gord and Alta Macfie - 611 hits - follow the link and check it out). Following that are the terms of reference of the various teams (471), links page (432), staff page (428), rentals (400, recordings of past services (371) and activities (346).

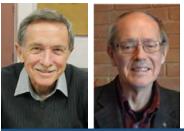
In 2022 when in-service worship services took place throughout the year, online attendance was not monitored weekly, but in the fall it has been between generally 15 and 20. Our YouTube channel had 132 subscribers at the end of 2022, up from 104 at the end of 2021. In the four weeks prior to the writing of this report (16/01/22) our YouTube channel had 419 views and 178.8 hours viewed.

Parkwood continues to maintain a presence on Facebook. Posts to our Facebook page tend to be links to the livestreamed services. In addition to the webservant, our minister, Christian Education Support Worker and the CE Team person who is liaison with RightNow Media have editing/posting privileges. A member of the Outreach team is also in the process of being added.

In addition to our main Facebook page, Parkwood Youth have a presence on Facebook maintained by our CE Support Worker.

J. Finance Team

There are several volunteers who handle the various aspects of the financial affairs of Parkwood. Betty Paul is the Envelope Secretary and maintains an accounting system for donations and income received. Dianne Nickerson prepares cheques to pay non-payroll invoices. Dennis Featherstone prepares cheques to forward donations for special appeals and the donations budgeted for the Mission Team. Ugo Kejeh is the Treasurer, prepares the monthly payroll and posts all cheques to the SAGE accounting system.

Kathy Newton prepares the bank reconciliation and financial statements and also makes various adjustments. Ugo then finalizes the standard monthly financial statement for use by each team and communication to the congregation by the Finance Team. Gord Walford processes the monthly e-transfers and provides general assistance to the financial process. The congregation is appreciative of the many hours the above volunteers provide to the financial process for Parkwood.

Loan Repayment Fund

A. History

As shown in Table LR1, the donation to the Loan Repayment Fund in 2022 was \$7,995 somewhat less than our target of \$10,000 for the year. The total donation less the loan payment led to a decrease in the fund balance of \$1,878 bringing the total balance in the fund to \$10,667. There have been four extra payments totalling \$16,394 which decreased the loan repayment period by over two years and saved total interest payments of roughly \$10,000.

A. Going Forward

Parkwood must make repayments on two loans in 2023, not just on the primary loan. In 2023, the required total loan repayment is \$17,118. The detailed financial repayment requirements for the retirement of the loans are set out in Table LR2. The required average annual repayment over the next five years is \$15,815. The current balance in the fund of just over \$10,000 should be used for any shortfall in donations over the next five years, not to provide the main source of the repayment in 2023.

C. Challenges

Parkwood is facing two challenges in the repayment of the loans. The immediate challenge is to make donations to be able to meet the required repayments for the two loans. The down-the-road challenge is to repay the main loan by 2027 in order to get a return of the roughly \$13,000 in interest payments. Parkwood's current focus should be on the immediate challenge. That challenge is to make donations of nearly \$16,000 annually for the next five years to meet the requirements to repay the loans.

D. Recommendation

The congregation increase its target for donations to the Loan Repayment Fund to \$17,000 for 2023.

The "review" of the Planned Giving Fund records for 2022 was undertaken during this same time period and appears to be in order. Details of this review were presented to the Planned Giving Fund Managers.

We would like to extend particular appreciation to Dianne Nickerson, cheque preparer, and Betty Paul, envelope secretary, for their meticulous work in preparation of cheques, deposits and documentation supporting the weekly offering, receipts and disbursement records. Their detailed work enabled the audit committee to be most efficient in its work.

I have confirmed that Stewart Elder and I are willing to serve as the Audit Committee for the year ending December 31, 2023. Rachel McGregor will not be continuing for the 2023 year. On behalf of the Committee I wish to extend sincere thanks to Rachel for her help these past few years.

As such, there is a need for an additional volunteer to join the committee, in particular to assist with "review" of the Planned Giving Fund records .

9. New Business



A. Budget Team Report and Recommendations

Overview for 2022

Donations for local purposes were up marginally (\$1,500) from 2021 and rental income increased marginally as well. Parkwood was again eligible for special government and utility subsidies which together led to revenue of over \$11,000. Total income for local purposes was \$221,318 while total expenditures for local purposes was \$217,934. As a result, there was a surplus for local purposes of \$3,384. It should be emphasized that without the subsidies there would have been a deficit.

Financial Goals for 2023

The three major financial goals are:

- Keep Parkwood a desirable place to worship by having sufficient staff, and attractive an safe building and support for a range of programs.
- Make a significant contribution to the Loan Repayment Fund to meet the higher repayment requirements for our two loans
- Continue to make important contributions for other goals such as our Benevolent Fund, Presbyterians Sharing and various missions such as PWS&D.

Recommendation #1

The Budget Team recommends that the congregation approve a target for offerings for Local Purposes of \$185,000 in 2023. (Line 1 in the table)

Recommendation #2

The Budget Team recommends that the congregation approve expenditures for Local Purposes of \$217,782 in 2022. This amount is

essentially unchanged from spending in 2022. (Line 14 in the table)

Budget Deficit

The combination of the two above recommendations, together with the forecast for rental and other income, would lead to a deficit of \$14,782 for 2023. (Line 25 in the table). Hopefully, generous donations and the typical lapsing of approved expenditures will lead to a lower deficit. As well, the Budget Team will monitor financial developments through the year and take action to work towards reducing the magnitude of an emerging deficit.

C. Outreach Working Group

Background

As a follow-up to a resolution introduced at the 2022 Parkwood Church congregational meeting, session in May appointed a working group (the Outreach Working Group) to develop a strategy for outreach to young adults (those aged 18-35). The working group's first meeting occurred in May 2022 with additional meetings held in October, November and January. Victoria Mabie, Dennis Featherstone, Paul Mkandawire, Martha Fair, Dale Tuck, Philip MacFie and Rev. James T. Hurd actively participated.

Vision

The Outreach Working Group's mission is based on Matthew 28:19 (The Great Commission). The group is exploring how Parkwood Church can more effectively share the gospel in our neighbourhood, city and world.

Statistics

Martha Fair provided an extensive statistical background on the demographics of Ottawa and Parkwood Hills. Highlights of her research included the following points:

- More than half of the immigrants who settled in Canada from 2016/2017 to 2020/2021 were millennials.
- 6% of the Capital's population consists of first-generation immigrants (those who have arrived in Canada since 2006). This number grows to 21% when only the neighbourhood of Parkwood Hills is considered (Ottawa Neighbourhood Survey).
- 70-80% of the 18-34 cohort is religiously committed although this does not translate into a faith in Jesus Christ (Bible Society)
- 47% of Canada's population is spiritually uncertain (Bible Society)

Key Questions

The Outreach Working Group discussions identified a number of key questions:

- What are the demographics in our general area?
- Who is my neighbour? (Luke 10:25-37)
- Why might people choose to "try" Parkwood church rather than another church in the area?
- What might people in the various age groups be seeking in a church in 2022?

Key Findings

Discussions among working group members remain ongoing. However, members agree that the following are important for any outreach strategy:

- Outreach should not be limited to just young adults aged 18-35. An effective strategy should take into account people in all walks of life.
- Outreach is the responsibility of every member of the congregation.
- An outreach strategy should take into account ministry to new Canadians.

Ongoing Activities

The Outreach Working Group noted that Parkwood Church is already involved in outreach activities. The congregation hosted Lunch and Learn sessions and welcomed students through the Algonquin Pause Table.

Next Steps

Members of the Outreach Working Group have an Interactive Church Service planned for January 29, 2023, at 7:00 pm for young adults aged 18-35.

Apart from new activities members of the Outreach Working Group have asked how can outreach be built in to activities that Parkwood is already doing.

The Outreach Working Group looks forward to continued discussion and new opportunities in 2023.

PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended December 31, 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

These financial statements report on the activities of Parkwood Presbyterian Church, 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario. The Church was originally established in February 1965.

The Church operates exclusively as a not-for-profit organization and as such is exempt from income tax. The Church is a registered charity.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, except for the following:

The church building and furnishings are stated at estimated replacement value based on an insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016.

The land is stated at nominal value as the cost is not determinable.

These statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting other than HST recoverable which is accrued at the time the expenditure to which it relates is incurred.

The following significant accounting principles have been used in preparation of these financial statements:

Revenue recognition:

Donations are recorded as revenue in the year in which they are received unless designated for a future period in which case they are deferred and taken into revenue in the period in which the related expenditure is made.

Financial instruments:

The Church's financial instruments are comprised of cash on hand and in the bank, short-term financial instruments, HST recoverable, current and long-term liabilities. All financial instruments are reported at their fair values on the statement of financial position. The fair values are the same as the carrying values due to the nature of the financial instruments. Unless disclosed elsewhere in the notes to the financial statements, it is management's opinion that the Church is not exposed to significant interest rate, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of asset and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. BUILDINGS AND FURNISHINGS:

The Church building and furnishing are recorded at estimated replacement value at December 31, 2017, based on the most recent insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016. The value of the Building and Furnishings at that time was estimated at \$2,628,751. The cost of land at 10 Chesterton Drive is recorded at a nominal value of \$1.

3. SECURED LOAN PAYABLE:

Lending Fund Loan

In December 2015, the Church secured a loan of \$65,000 from the <u>Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church in</u> <u>Canada</u> (the Fund). The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015.

In July 2016, the Church secured a further advance of \$35,000 from the <u>Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church</u> <u>in Canada</u> which was also obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building, as approved at its

Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016. The Lending Fund loan is secured by a charge on the land and building at 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario.

The loan is interest free for the first 6 years, with 7% interest per annum on the outstanding balance thereafter from the 7th to the 15th year. Payments on the loan are to be made quarterly, based on a predetermined repayment schedule with interest amounts being added to the principal repayment amount beginning in the 7th year (2022). Extra payments on principal may be made at no cost, providing advance notice of the payment is provided.

The total principal repayment due in the 12 months ending December 31, 2023, is \$7,167.

Extension Fund Loan

In May 2016, the Church secured a loan of \$30,000 from the <u>Extension Fund of the Presbyterian Church in</u> <u>Canada, the Presbytery of Ottawa</u>. The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016.

The Loan is unsecured and repayable in full, by May 9, 2027. There will be no interest charged on or before May 9, 2022. Should any portion of the loan be outstanding as of May 10, 2023 there is interest charged on the outstanding balance at an annual rate of interest equal to the average GIC rate of interest available from the 5 largest Canadian chartered banks. Principal repayments of the loan are due as follows: \$6,000 due annually, on or before each of the following dates: May 9, 2023; May 9, 2024, May 9, 2025; May 9, 2026; and May 9, 2027.

The total principal repayment due in the 12 months ending December 31, 2023, is \$6,000.

4. INTERFUND TRANSFERS: During the year ended December 31, 2022 the following transfers between funds were made:

- \$7,167 was transferred from the Loan Repayment Fund to the Operating Fund, for the purpose of principal repayments on the Secured Lending Fund Loan.
- \$5,000 was transferred from the Planned Giving Fund to the external Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund account currently held at BMO to be invested in accordance with the terms of reference passed by Session on June 25, 2018.
- \$315 was transferred from the Memorial Fund to the Operating Fund based on direction from the donor.

5. ENDOWMENT/PLANNED GIVING MINISTRY FUND:

The Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund is restricted and accounts for donations received where the donor requested that the principal be maintained by the Church on a permanent basis, or for a specified fixed term, with the interest earned by the invested principal to be allocated for a specific purpose approved by Session.

6. ROOF REPAIR UNDER INSURANCE:

Storm damage to the church building roof was repaired in 2022 using insurance proceeds. The net cost of the repairs was \$57,056.78. Insurance proceeds were \$55,056.78 resulting in a net cost to the Church of \$2,500.00.

7. RESERVE FOR CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FUND:

Receipts include a contribution of \$24,960 for the purposes of building renovations.

8. INTERNAL BORROWING:

At the Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015, a motion was approved by the congregation to borrow internally from the Organ Replacement Fund for purposes of funding the proposed building construction project. The total transfer from the Organ Replacement Fund to the Building Replacement Fund during the year ended December 31, 2016, was \$15,000. This internal loan was made on an interest-free basis with no fixed terms of repayment.

A word from the Minister

In reviewing the annual report of Parkwood Church for the year 2023, these words from 1 Corinthians 12: 4-7 come to mind:

"There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men. Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good." (NIV)

The apostle Paul, with the heart of Jesus Christ and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, sought to care for, encourage, and empower the diverse people who were the church of Corinth to work together for the glory of God and the furtherance of God's kingdom. He recognizes each person's particular gifts, while directing attention to the truth that all such gifts come from the same source — God's Holy Spirit — and are designed and intended to be used for the same purpose — the glory of God. Having designed the world and created those who live in it, God calls a people for His own, and intends us to live together in community and to discover, grow in, and share the love of God revealed to us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

In our recent studies in the parables of Jesus, we have been looking at different ways in which the kingdom of God is revealed and comes to be experienced in our lives and in the life of the world around us. I am reminded every Sunday morning as we gather for worship how diverse is the body of Christ. I am also reminded in reading the annual report how so many different people with different gifts and skills and experiences work together to contribute to the life and witness of this congregation and for our service in Jesus' name to the community and the world in which we live, and among which we are called to honour and serve Jesus.

The apostle Paul further expands upon his teaching and exhortation to the church in Corinth in the letter to the Romans:

"Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God — this is your spiritual act of worship. Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is — his good, pleasing and perfect will.

"For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the measure of faith God has given you. Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully. (Romans 12: 1-8, NIV)

Here are words for us to take to heart and to inform and guide our reflections on the life of the church in the past year, and to inspire and direct our intentions and efforts in the year to come.

A. Clerk of Session

Four main issues occupied Session's attention on an ongoing basis during the past year:

- Session devoted significant amount of time and energy at different points over the year grappling with the budget to bridge the projected expenditure deficit in our operating account.
- Session also devoted significant attention towards supporting the Ottawa Korean Presbyterian Church and Assembly of God (Portuguese) who use our church building for worship.
- Session has from time to time over the past year reflected and debated on the implications for Parkwood of the General Assembly's changes effected by Remits B and C.
- Assessment of Parkwood membership post-pandemic

Session's work on the budget include:

(i) Encouraging fundraising ideas to generate revenue to help reduce our projected operating budget deficit.(ii) Devising a communication strategy to provide information to the congregation and help members consider increasing their givings towards Parkwood's operating account.

Session's work on supporting OKPC and AG (Portuguese) include:

(i) Review and approval of terms of reference for renting the church building in view of inflation.(ii) Holding regular meetings with OKPC to improve communication and develop a good working relationship and find ways of meeting each other's space needs.

Session's work concerning changes to Remits B and C include:

(i) Met with members of session from Grace Orleans, St. Paul's, and Knox Manotick to learn from each other and for mutual support.

(ii) Convened congregational meetings (one online, one in-person) to listen to members of Parkwood about what they think about the changes effected by Remits B and C.

Assessment of Parkwood membership post-pandemic

Session conducted a thorough assessment to provide a sense of the number of Parkwood members and adherents who have stopped participating in worship (in-person or online) since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic and the reasons why. The aim was to take stock of the membership and use the findings to inform our outreach strategy.

Other activities undertaken by Session/Session Clerk:

(i) Complied minutes of the annual congregational meeting convened in February 2023.

(ii) Prepared and submitted the 2024 Canada Summer Jobs application (due Jan 10, 2024) for Summer

Program Assistant position at Parkwood.

(iii) Established Media Support Team as a stand-alone ministry team.

D. Representative Elder

As of the end of 2023 the Presbytery of Ottawa consists of eighteen churches plus one mission work, the Jesus the Only Way Arabic Evangelical Mission which began in 2015 as an initiative of Grace Church, Orleans. The church plant in Rockland officially closed in March 2023. The Presbytery in partnership with the Presbytery of Seaway-Glengarry employed a part-time Ministry Animator, Cheryl Gaver, up to Cheryl's passing in April 2022; in the fall of 2023 a search was initiated to find a replacement. The presbytery also oversees the operation of Gracefield Christian Came and Retreat Centre through a Board of Directors. 2023 saw one induction and one retirement, as well as two transitions to full retirement; one minister continues as stated supply – Justin Kim at St. Andrew's Church, Aylmer. Four churches are vacant: St. Andrew's Aylmer (operating under a long-term supply arrangement), St. Martin & St. David, St. Andrew's Richmond and Grace Orleans. Three persons were removed from the roll of Presbytery due to death: Linda Robinson and Kalman Gondocz and retired missionary Pauline Brown. The presbytery met eight times in 2023.

I serve Synod of Quebec & Eastern Ontario as the convener of the Finance Committee and as such am a member of Synod Council. The Synod consists of five Presbyteries: Quebec, Montreal, Seaway-Glengarry, Ottawa and Lanark-Renfrew. Synod Council met three times in 2023, in February, briefly in June and in September, via Zoom; Synod did not meet in October – it meets every 2nd year. 2024 will include a conference with speaker Rev. Carey Nieuwhof.

James also sits on Synod Council, as clerk of our presbytery. I also serve as a member of the PCC's Committee to Nominate Standing Committees, representing the Synod. This is a 3-year appointment, ending in June 2024.

Our minister is the Presbytery Clerk; the Moderator is John Tyler, representative elder of Westminster Church, Ottawa. A number of Parkwood people sit on Presbytery committees.

It has been an honour and a privilege to serve the Presbytery of Ottawa and the Synod of Quebec & Eastern Ontario this past year.

I. Planned Giving Ministry

There was a donation of \$5,000 to the Planned Giving Ministry in 2023. The practice is to transfer the donation to the separate bank account for the Planned Giving Ministry at BMO. As of the end of 2023, a total of \$39,000 has been donated to the Planned Giving Ministry.

The Budget arm of P&P has worked diligently all year to address financial issues that still haunt us post-Covid. Thanks to their work and the congregation's response to the "minute person" appeal made in early December 2023, we hope to squeak through another year without an overwhelming deficit.

Through the Media Support Team's IT personnel, we reviewed issues regarding security with respect to access to sensitive data on our office computers. This issue has now been resolved.

Insurance rates continue to rise and frustrations continue to be present in dealing with the insurer.

There has been no progress on microfilming our records as Rev. Hurd has yet to travel to Toronto saving us hundreds of dollars in shipping costs. However, we continue to be mindful of the importance of this duty as well as the cost of doing so. Session and team records will be delivered to the Presbyterian Archives for microfilming and return as soon as we are able to do so.

We were fortunate to have an increase in rentals during the past year which helped to cover the costs of our operations. For continuity and record-keeping, we are spending, and have spent, some time reviewing rental contracts/agreements to make sure everything is current and in good order.

The team continues to review and revise terms of reference (ToR) for the various teams with the help of the team members. This past year ToR for the Memorial Fund were revised.

We continue to consider future goals and strategies for growth, participation, outreach, rentals, etc. The Volunteer Fair held in September during our Corn Boil showed off the work of all our teams and elicited some interest in the work of Parkwood. The Craft Group drew interest in participation and earned money toward church projects. We pray that with God's grace we will continue to grow in both spiritual and physical ways to further His kingdom.

B. Worship Co-ordination Team

Much of what the WCT does throughout the year is routine in the sense that we basically repeat what we have done the year before. This is particularly the case with Christmas and Easter. The Sanctuary and the Gathering Place need to be decorated and we call on Pam Pestaluky and Holly MacDonald and their elves, namely Don Pestaluky and Jim MacDonald, their spouses, to carry out the work. This they willingly did again in 2023 and we thank them for their work.

The other item we value at Christmas is the Advent Candle holder which graces the Sanctuary on the Sundays leading up to Christmas. As team leader for WCT I take the responsibility of setting it up each year. This means making sure we have the right candles and lighters. Between Brenda Creighton and myself we monitor it each week. Also as team leader, it usually falls to me to recruit readers for the four Advent Sundays, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. For Advent and the lighting of the Advent Candles we like to have a family each time. For Christmas Eve and Christmas Day individuals are needed, so it involves upwards of twenty people. Thanks again to those who willingly agreed to be readers for 2023 and who faithfully came.

Karen Hurd made a new "Bethlehem" backdrop for the Christmas nativity scene. The "Sheep Ladies" group were responsible for knitting the sheep used for distribution to each child during their story time.

The annual Easter breakfast, which follows the Sunrise service at the Arboretum, is organized jointly with the Fellowship Team and its leader, Don Pestaluky. Each year we determine when the sun will rise on Easter Sunday morning and then time the breakfast accordingly for those who come to the church after the service. In 2023 both teams worked together again with the very capable supervision and provision of Ed and Vicki Steenhorst who provided a wonderful breakfast of pancakes and sausages along with coffee and juice and syrup. We thank them all and especially Ed and Vicki for their organization and cooking skills. It was also fun for us all to work together.

We thank Margaret McPherson who decorates the church with plants throughout the year. Another annual service which WCT is responsible for decorating is Remembrance Day. We normally pick the Sunday just prior to Remembrance Day and retrieve from storage the Remembrance Day wreath and place it in the Sanctuary in a prominent place.

Thanksgiving is also an annual time in which we decorate the Communion Table with produce symbolic of the harvest. For 2023 we thank Ted and Susanne Johnson and Sarah Maddex for providing the produce and arranging the decoration. The Table was also blessed to have a new communion cloth. Leah Hopp, our missionary in Uganda, provided the material which featured grapes and grains. Dianne Nickerson undertook the task of sewing it in consultation with Alta MacFie and Claire McPhee. It was used on Thanksgiving Sunday, 2023. Our sincere thanks to those involved for the enhancement of the Communion Table and thus the sanctuary and worship service.

The ongoing weekly task of the WCT involves the ushering for the Sunday morning worship services, but we are also called upon for weddings and funerals that are conducted at Parkwood. At the start of each new year we issue an updated ushers' schedule for the 52 weeks ahead. We are so grateful for those who agree to do this work and we have two new ushers for 2024 who will bring our team numbers up to seven from six.

Ushering involves more than just handing out an order of service each Sunday. There are the routine things that must be done to prepare for worship, but the ushers are also alert to any need that may arise before, during or after the service. They are there to serve. They are often, for the most part, the first person a visitor will meet and so their countenance and greeting are important attributes in making all, even the regulars, feel welcome.

On September 17, 2023 we had our first in-person WCT meeting since COVID. We met for planning some of the routine events happening at Parkwood, but our main item of business was to decide what to do about the arrangement on the chancel. The grand piano had brought about some suggested changes at the front of the church that were tried. However, in consultation with the choir it was agreed to return the chancel to its original layout, while accommodating the grand piano. Jim MacDonald, team leader for Media Support, was invited to the meeting for any input that would affect Sunday morning worship, audio-visuals, and arrangements for projection and livestreaming.

WCT also took part in the Kiosk Volunteer Fair on September 10. Our thanks to Susanne Johnson for a poster and pictures for our booth. From that day, we had one person come and volunteer to be an usher. We are most grateful to Viris Williams and look forward to serving with her.

Our thanks from WCT goes out to Dianne Smith, our Director of Music Ministry and to the choir under her direction. She and the choir are there every Sunday to lead the congregation in the singing of hymns as part of the worship service. They rehearse every week so that what they do on Sunday morning, whether it be an anthem or leading the singing, will be glorifying to God and inspiring the congregation to sing in praise.

We are also grateful to Jim MacDonald and the Media Support Team for their weekly work at transmitting the morning worship service which means coming in early each Sunday morning to set up and get things ready to go for a 10:00 am service start. They are also called upon when there is a funeral service that requires audio-visuals and/or livestreaming. Plus, they have to cope with any little glitches or electronic gremlins that happen before or during the service. Well done to you all!

The average attendance over 49 Sundays was 60 persons. In addition, there is an online presence with an estimated 10-25 views during the livestream and additional views later on.

In Psalm 29:2 David wrote – "Ascribe to the Lord the glory due his name; worship the Lord in the splendor of holiness." Let us bear that in mind when we enter his sanctuary to worship.

Youth Group, High School Sunday School, and Young Adult Services

This past year has been a year of growth for the youth group at Parkwood. Since the end of 2022, with new families and kids moving up into the youth group age range, we have almost doubled our numbers of youth attending on Friday nights. For the first time in a number of years, we were in person for the entirety of the year, not having to hold youth events online as we did during the pandemic.

January kicked off with a "Minute-to-Win-It" night, where the youth participated in a number of short games that required them to complete various tasks in under a minute. All participated well, joined in the friendly competition, and won some prizes at the end of the game. As we moved into February, we took one Friday night and went bowling as a group, discovering that we have some very skilled bowlers in our group. We then started up our nights where we would have a Bible study, some games and activities, and then a snack at the end of the night. In March, we attended the Ottawa 67's Faith Day hockey game at TD Place, watching the Ottawa 67's take on the Barrie Colts, beating them 5-1.

Between April and June, we had an Easter egg hunt around the church with an Easter message on Good Friday, a scavenger hunt also around the church, and an escape room written and set up by Sunjay and Victoria Henry, and then figured out by four crafty youth and two clever leaders. Some offsite events during the spring included glow-in-the-dark mini golf and a trip to the trampoline park.

During the summer months, we had a summer student, Alice Veras, who led the youth events during July and August. She had a trivia afternoon, a movie afternoon with popcorn and drinks, a painting event, and a bracelet making event. This helped to keep the kids engaged and connected over the summer months while they were on summer vacation.

In September, we started up again having some nights with games and a Bible discussion. We had a Thanksgiving evening that included games one would find at a fall festival. We also had a pumpkin carving night in October where the youth got to either carve or paint a pumpkin, and could also dress up in a costume if they wanted. We had a baking night in November where we had multiple baking mixes (brownies, no-bake cheesecake, cakes, etc.) and they got to make what they wanted and add their own creative touch to their treats.

To end off 2023, we had a joint Christmas party with the youth groups from St. Paul's Presbyterian Church and Knox Presbyterian Church in Manotick. We had lasagna, garlic bread, salads, and pizza for dinner. The youth played some Christmas games, decorated ugly Christmas sweater cookies, and participated in a Christmas gift exchange.

On Friday nights during the fall where we did not have youth group, the youth (grades 5 and up) were invited to meet at Sir Winston Churchill Public School for two hours at the gym, playing all sorts of games and sports. Basketball was a particular favourite with many of the youth. After the time at the gym, we would head back to Parkwood Church for some snacks and a short devotion. This was a good outreach opportunity to the community as we had a few new kids join us for the evenings.

High School Sunday School has continued to meet during the Sunday morning worship service downstairs in the youth room. We have worked through a number of series this year from *Ministry to Youth*. In previous years,

individual studies from this organization have been used with the youth, so we decided to purchase a yearlong curriculum with twelve months of lessons. Some of the topics discussed were being rooted in their faith and learning the fundamentals of it; our moods and emotions and how to respond in a Godly way; how to be awesome – how to love and serve others; and love stories – what true love looks like by looking at four great love stories in the Bible. We have had a couple of new people join the class this fall. Numbers tend to fluctuate week to week, but while youth may not come every week, they join when they can.

Starting January 2023, we began a Sunday evening service for young adults. It is an interactive service, meaning that instead of a sermon being preached, there is more of a discussion-based format, where people can ask questions and discuss the passages being reflected upon. There is a time of worship and prayers as well. The hope through these services is to reach out to the young adults in the community and growing the young adult ministry at Parkwood.

Thank you to all of our helpers for youth group this year – Violet Busat, Derek Newton, Philip MacFie, and Sunjay Henry. Thank you to Peter Paul for help with Sunday School, as well as Derek Newton for filling in for a few Sundays throughout the year. Thank you to all who have contributed to the Interactive Services this year – Pastor James Hurd, Philip MacFie, Derek Newton, Violet Busat, Jill Wu, Sunjay Henry, and Savannah Elder. You are all such a blessing to the youth, the young adults, the youth ministry, the young adult ministry and to myself. None of this would be possible without you.

D. Pastoral Care Team

The members of Parkwood's Pastoral Care team are Rev. Hurd, Marcia Harten, Betty Paul, Tami Kamou, Laura Game, Margaret Roach, Dale Tuck, Dora Brown and (LOA) Barbara Townsend. Rev. Hurd is chair and Dora Brown secretary.

The team began meeting via Zoom conference during the early Covid restrictions, and has continued to do for accessibility for members. Each meeting is opened with prayer and devotions by a team member.

We reviewed and discussed activities in relation to the pandemic and other issues arising from pastoral care team visits in person or telephone. The cancellation of the twice-yearly pastoral care mid-week communion services and the monthly "Lunch and Learn" sessions were reviewed. Spiritual care volunteers were restricted from visiting patients and residents in hospitals or nursing homes until spring 2023.Team members continued to respond to a pastoral care need if it was brought to their attention. Issues were discussed at team meetings and dealt with according to our resources, information and knowledge.

Worship services at Nursing Homes and Retirement Residences had also been cancelled during the pandemic. During the latter part of the year we cautiously restarted worship services at Peter D. Clark. Rev. John Fair is conducting a service once a month at the home. Dora Brown continued to volunteer by contacting pastors and the home by telephone and email to organize the resident worship services. We were often short of pastors to conduct the services or visit residents. The Spiritual Care Team of Peter D. Clark held periodic spiritual care meetings via Zoom. Rev. Hurd and Dora Brown attended these meetings.

We explored ways to provide means to members to listen to the church services, especially those in hospital or nursing homes. We also discussed transportation for those unable to take Para Transpo or drive a car to church service, and a notice placed in the church bulletin for help. This remains an issue. The pastoral care communion service planned for 2024 will need drivers. The ability for people to come together on YouTube or Zoom for church services, social time, and to attend meetings has been helpful to maintain connection to each other, and for spiritual health and mental well-being.

In November 2022 we held the first Lunch and Learn following the suspension of such gatherings at the outset of the pandemic. In Spring 2023 we resumed them again and held one in March on fraud, computing and online issues. The speaker was Taffy Nahas, lawyer who works for the city of Ottawa. In April, the topic was addiction and mental health, presented by Ottawa Mental Health and Addictions Centre. The May session was on Advance Care planning by Compassion C are Ottawa. In November, the Lunch and Learn speaker was Anita Finley from Ottawa Recreation who spoke on "Be fit – be functional". For the December session we focused on sharing Christmas memories. Approximately 30 people attended each Lunch and Learn. We advertise the events through various media available to the church community, through the community resource centre (NROCRC) and via the local city councillor's communications.

In the fall, Dora Brown resigned as Lunch and Learn coordinator. She received a letter of appreciation from session thanking her for the many years she had served in this role.

An Emergency Contact form was developed for the congregation to complete and be held in confidence at the church. The form invites members and adherents to provide contact information for family or others whom we could contact in case one were unable to notify the church of absence due to illness or other reasons. This has provided very helpful in certain recent situations, enabling us to offer pastoral care which otherwise would not have been possible.

It was brought to our attention that two people should be in the elevator in case of a sudden illness or accident and in any case it is important to have a way to communicate with someone outside the elevator if assistance is needed. We also have a wheelchair is stored in the front entrance to use in an emergency. During the year a wheelchair was given to the church by Don Brown to use as necessary.

Pastoral Care includes in their budget subscription for a quantity of the large print "Today" devotional booklets, which are provided to Peter D. Clark residents and to individuals within Parkwood Church and beyond. Some are mailed out by the church office, others delivered by Betty Paul to the nursing home, still others available at the church office for pickup or delivery by team members or elders.

The Prayer Chain, co-ordinated by Jean Elder, sends out prayer requests by e-mail to the prayer team weekly and as requests were received. Once again this has been a busy year for Jean. Several members of our congregation have asked for prayers for their loved ones. The team recommended to the session that all elders be on the list to receive the prayer chain communications, and session agreed with this.

The booklets "Journeying Through Grief" were sent to families or individuals who had suffered a loss. The booklets express care and support for those at different stages of the grief process.

Laura Game on behalf of the Pastoral Care team sent cards and notes to congregation members who had experienced a loss of a loved one, suffered an illness, experienced a special event and also for Christmas.

Pastoral care visits to patients of the Presbyterian faith at the Ottawa Hospital Civic Campus and Queensway Carleton Hospital were suspended during the pandemic. The spiritual care offices in each hospital are now once again inviting clergy and other volunteers to resume visits. The Presbytery of Ottawa pastoral care coordinator position has not been filled. Rev. Hurd is the Presbyterian representative on Queensway Carleton Hospital Pastoral Care Advisory Committee which has not yet resumed meetings. Marcia Harten and Tami Kamou have both offered to serve as volunteer visitors at the Queensway Carleton and steps are underway to enable their orientation.

The Ottawa Pastoral Care Training course, part of the requirements for pastoral care and to serve as a pastoral care visitor in hospitals, was held on Zoom. The Ottawa Pastoral Care Training Program also held spiritual care continuing education events and advanced courses on Zoom. We continue to encourage more congregation members to take the Pastoral Care Training Program.

Barrhaven Bible Study

At the close of 2023 our Bible study group completed its thirteenth year (January 16, 2011) of meeting together for the purpose of studying the word of God. Since October of 2020, due to COVID, we have met on Zoom and it has been a joy and privilege to welcome people from six churches, not including Parkwood and two folks from other provinces. We appreciate all who take the time to attend each week and for their continued interest and participation.

At the end of 2022 we were half-way through 1 John and so we continued with it into 2023. After completing 1 John we went on to study 2 and 3 John, finishing up in June and breaking for the summer. In June we surveyed the group to see what they might like to study in the fall of 2023. The consensus seemed to be one of the gospels and so we chose the gospel of John.

It has proven to be a challenge for us. John's gospel is quite different from the three synoptic gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke. Their focus is more biographical in describing the life and ministry of Christ. John gives his readers that, but more from a theological and doctrinal viewpoint. For instance, in the first 18 verses of chapter one, John verifies for his reader the all-important divine and human nature and person of Christ, the Word becoming flesh, dwelling among us. He establishes right away who Jesus is and maintains that theme as he recalls and records his encounters with people. Nearly half the gospel covers the last week of Jesus' life. Christ as redeemer and saviour were important to John and so we see that emphasis throughout his gospel.

We begin each study with prayer for the hour ahead. We start at 7:30 and finish at 8:30. We also pray for any needs that the group brings forward. We have a "Meet and Greet" session beginning at 7:15 p.m. so that any who wish to can come early for a wee chat before we begin.

You do not have to be a Bible scholar to attend. Notes are provided, which we walk through and are open to questions or comments at the end of each passage. As we have learned so far in our study of the gospel of John, those who spent time with Jesus came away enriched and changed. Two of John the Baptist's disciples spent time with Jesus and one of them, Andrew, became a disciple of Jesus. The Samaritan woman at the well in chapter four told her town folk about Jesus. They came and asked him to stay which he did for two days and they came away as believers. When you spend time with Jesus in his word you come away enriched and blessed. Your faith is deepened which is why John wrote his gospel. At the end John stated – "But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name." John 20:31. There is always room on Zoom. Come and join us.

Algonquin Pause Table

Parkwood Church has been involved with the Algonquin College Pause Table for many, many years. Linda Robinson from Parkwood, before she passed away, was the very able coordinator and shopper and participant for many years. When she could no longer do the shopping, I volunteered to do that, plus serve at the table as Martha and I had been doing already.

The Pause Table is part of the outreach of the Algonquin College Chaplaincy. Free Bibles and a Parkwood pamphlet are provided if requested. This initiative helps connect students with Campus Ministry and local Christian Church programs, a true blessing for both.

Each church that is involved is asked to do one day for the exam period. The Table runs from 10 a.m. -2 p.m. but each church must come at 9:00 to set up. Three large, long tables are supplied in the Student Commons Building which is a hub for the students going back and forth to class rooms during the exam period.

Churches are free to supply whatever refreshment they wish. Parkwood opted years ago, under Linda's guidance to supply home-baked goods such as muffins, cookies, loaves, plus milk, chocolate milk, fruit drinks and fruits such as apples, bananas. We have carried on in her footsteps. We also take two large coffee urns for coffee and a kettle for making tea.

People from Parkwood supply a lot of the home-baked goods which the students really appreciate. Carolyn Herbert introduced hard-boiled eggs to the 'menu' which were readily scooped up by the students. We have had monetary donations which helps with the cost which can range from \$200-\$250. We purchase what we have to at the Independent Grocer just below the church and they give us a 10% discount.

We also appreciate those who are able to come and help the day of, because it gets very busy from about 9:40 a.m. when the students start to come until we run out of supplies. We have upwards of 500 very grateful students who come. Officially we don't start until 10:00 but they are hungry and thirsty especially for coffee and fruit drinks.

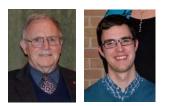

G. Mission Team

2023 AGM Mission Team Budget approved Support

Using the Sunday Bulletin, participants were thanked for all their support and prayers and advised to stand down with respect to the project, as the "Fill a Pallet" delivery target had been met.

On June 20, a driver from ERB Transporters, Ottawa Terminal arrived to pick up our pallet for shipment to CSM in Hamilton. Both the driver and the transport vehicle were very impressive, efficient and helpful.

H. Facility Management Team

During 2023, FMT experienced a change in leadership. Terry McBurney retired in September and Jim MacFie took over as chair. Our Administrative Assistant position remained stable in 2023, but the caretaker changed in June from Sunkyu Kim to Aguek Ngor. Ted Johnson was welcomed as a new member of FMT. Alice Veras was hired as our summer student for eight weeks in July and August.

Throughout the year, FMT undertook a steady flow of maintenance activities such as:

- Window coverings for the new windows in the Volunteer Office, the Minister's Study, the Meeting Room and the back of the Sanctuary
- Defibrillator replacement
- Yard cleanup
- BBQ replacement
- Contracts for snow removal and yard maintenance
- Emergency equipment maintenance

There was no fire safety inspection in 2023 but there will be in 2024 (approximately \$1000). A first aid course was organized to take place in 2024.

A major activity was the preparation of emergency plans led by Martha Fair. Four documents were forwarded to Policy and Planning for their input and finalization:

- Emergency Plan
- Fire safety plan firefighters' copy
- Fire safety plan staff copy
- Fire evacuation plan

Capital expenditures were significant in 2023, made possible by generous donations from the congregation specifically for capital purposes. Two projects in particular were important:

- Water backflow prevention device as mandated by the City of Ottawa
- Attic remediation work including improved ventilation, replacement of water damaged insulation and augmentation of insulation generally. This is intended to solve a persistent ceiling leak in and around the Minister's Study and the Gathering Place.

Despite these significant accomplishments, an important capital project was unavoidably delayed until 2024, specifically the urgent completion of the window replacement program which will cost in the order of \$20,000.

Events

2023 was another busy year with scheduling of groups and meetings at the church or on Zoom. I schedule Zoom meetings so we can ensure that there is someone who can run the meeting and that there isn't an overlap as we only have one Zoom subscription. Elizabeth Mabie, our Admin Assistant in the office, sets up the Zoom invitations and sends them out to the person hosting a meeting.

We continue to share our building with the Ottawa Korean Presbyterian Church (OKPC) and the Assembly of God Church. Sundays are busy, as all three churches have worship services in the Sanctuary and fellowship time after their services. The church is booked from 9 am until 10 pm. These churches also have other meetings during each week.

Recovery on the Hill (an AA group) meets on Thursday evenings and a new Eritrean prayer group meets on Saturday afternoons. We continue to be the evacuation site for a local school. We provided floor sleeping space and kitchen use for a sleepover for a youth group from Kingston and rented to an organization which provided counselling sessions to young people and their parents. We also hosted a bridal shower and a morning prayer group for another ministry. This year we also rented space for a spring break camp as well as a four-week summer camp for a returning renter.

There were many funerals at Parkwood in 2023, which required more connections with the Fellowship Team and Media Support Team.

All of the rentals require a lot of paperwork, including scheduling, permission from Session (if necessary) which requires preparation of a brief note for session including prices, and a package price (prepared in conjunction with the Finance co-chair). I also draft additional conditions to the required Facility Use Form and work with the renter to ensure the proper insurance is purchased by them. Consultation is needed with Facility Management for caretaker services and Media Support Team if AV services are needed. Once signatures are completed, I provide training on using the building and usually attend on the day of the event to answer questions and resolve arising issues and collect the rental fees.

I answer many requests from outside groups wishing to rent, usually via email. Each request is considered according to Parkwood's guidelines and not all inquiries result in a rental.

Parkwood Church Activities appear on a calendar in the Gathering Place, on the website and on the back page of the Pulse. All booked uses of the building appear on the **Parkwood Events** calendars in the Volunteer Room. They are updated weekly. Parkwood Events calendars are emailed to team leads and other affected people as well as the caretaker and snow removal company. I also email the caretaker and snow removal contractor when there are changes to the schedule and program the thermostats in the building for the weekly meetings. If you host a monthly meeting you will have to arrive earlier to turn up the heat before your meeting.

As we have a part-time caretaker and many events occur on the weekend, it is appreciated when people clean up after their meetings and return tables and chairs to their regular arrangement. I couldn't do this work without the support of our caretakers, Sunkyu Kim who left for university at the end of the summer and for our new caretaker, Aguek Ngor who has taken on the challenge.

And finally, thanks to Dennis Featherstone, Paul Mkandawire and Pastor James for their continued guidance.

I. Media Support Team

The Media Support Team was formed in late 2021 and Jim MacDonald serves as the Team Leader. The purpose of the Media Support Team is to facilitate the development and implementation of a media plan or strategy to support and encourage all ministry teams (Worship Co-ordination, Christian Education, Fellowship, Mission, Outreach, Pastoral Care, Facility Management, and Finance) and the congregation as a whole to reach out, using audio-visual technologies, to the congregation and the broader community to achieve the mission of Parkwood Church.

The Support Groups include:

- 1. The Audio-Visual Support Group
- 2. The IT Support Group
- 3. The Website Support Group
- 4. The Content Support Group

Audio-Visual Support Group

Mohammad Raouf is the technical owner of the live streaming and works to address technical issues associated with it.

Violet Busat, Jim MacDonald, Sunjay Henry, Mohammad Raouf, Alice Veras, Kloee Game, Asuquo Eniang and Keith Takayesu have been running the Sunday morning live streaming.

Mohammad Raouf monitors the livestream and is available in real time to help support encountered issues.

Alta MacFie coordinates the power point operators for each Sunday. Joelle Hanna, Golda Akat, Alta MacFie, Tony Abou Kasem, Eileen and Keith Takayesu, Alice Veras, Candys Bwiza, Gerald and Rhoda Reid, Philip MacFie and Mohammad Raouf ran the power point.

We are thankful for their service in the worship of our Lord.

During the past year, there were about 1300 total views of the Parkwood church services streamed live at 10:00 a.m. Sunday morning. There have been 5000 "views" accessing the YouTube channel recording after the 10:00 a.m. worship service.

Meetings needing AV equipment are booked through Parkwood Events. Jim MacDonald arranges AV requirements in the Sanctuary. Events outside the Sanctuary are handled by Brenda Creighton who provides training and setup of equipment for renters and Parkwood events, like Lunch & Learn.

Zoom for In-House Meetings - When a live meeting in the Fellowship Hall also required a Zoom connection for people not in attendance, it was discovered that the Internet feed to the church along with WiFi was not strong enough to work smoothly. The IT Team was asked to investigate having an Ethernet (wired) connection to the Fellowship Hall. Dan Moffet, with the assistance of Peter Paul and Jim MacDonald, was able to install an Ethernet jack in the Fellowship Hall and a second one in the Meeting Room.

The next challenge was to develop a system whereby distant attendees could see and hear what was happening

in the Hall and the people in the Hall could see and hear the distant attendees when they wanted to contribute to the discussion. It required a USB camera, two microphones, the portable sound system, a video display and a

computer to connect to the Zoom meeting. It also required a device whereby the audio to and from the Hall could be sent and received without feedback or interference. It turns out they make a gizmo for that! It is a miniature sound mixer that has a USB connection to send and receive sound from a computer attending the Zoom call and deliver audio to the portable sound system. It takes about an hour to set up and test. It was successfully used for the first time for a special Presbytery Meeting hosted at Parkwood.

If you have an event in the church that needs this service, contact Parkwood Events to make arrangements.

The Audio-Visual group has prepared a list of Parkwood's audio-visual capabilities. These are available to Parkwood's ministry Teams as well as to renters of the church.

IT Support Group

Members of the IT Team are Brenda Creighton, Asuquo Eniang, Jim MacDonald, Regan Rambally and Gord Walford

This year we worked on the following:

- The volunteer computer now has good performance. This was due to the donation of a computer from another church. Asuquo Eniang and Brenda Creighton did the heavy lifting and reassigned the computers to ensure the better-quality computers are available for the most important tasks. As part of this the old volunteer computer was freed up and donated to a person in the congregation.
- Asuquo upgraded the desktop computers from Windows 10 to 11.
- Asuquo and Brenda created a system for automatic backup of the church computers to our file server. A copy of this backup is then stored offsite on a weekly basis.
- Brenda installed upgrades to the Windows operating system and Norton Antivirus on all computers and laptops.
- Brenda prepared a laptop for and trained the Summer Program Assistant to use it to show the videos needed for the Mid-Week Fellowship.
- Provided support for all IT related issues encountered at the church.
- Regan Rambally continues to support and troubleshoot the telephone system (Forti Voice).
- Asuquo continues to program the outside electronic sign.
- Gord Walford maintains the website with Asuquo's support and provides behind-the-scenes support for office email.

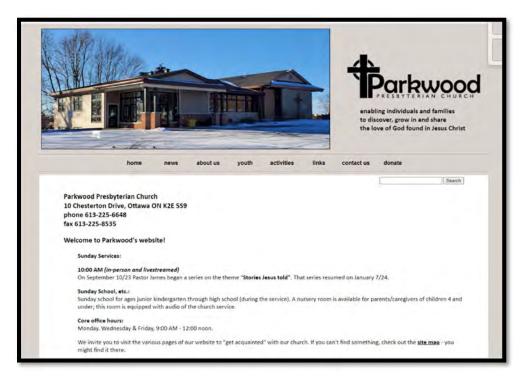

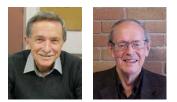
Parkwood church has had a presence on the world-wide web since April 1996. The site is maintained by Gord Walford. Weekly updates are made on Fridays (link to bulletin and livestream for upcoming service) and Sundays (removal of worship links from homepage, adjustment of text on news page). Thanks to Mohammad Raouf and Jim MacDonald and the team of volunteers for livestreaming and projection. Weekly bulletins, monthly calendars and Pulse newsletters are provided by the office admin Elizabeth Mabie, events coordinator Brenda Creighton and the Pulse editor, Carrie Morris. We continue to publish the monthly Pulse newsletter (including summer months when the printed edition goes on vacation). A one-year archive of newsletters is available on the website.

Statistics for 2023 show a slight decline in visitors (-2.7%), visits (-4.2%), hits (-3.4%) and bandwidth (-7.8%), and an increase in pages visited (+8.4%). Online views were not monitored weekly, but recent evidence is that weekly viewing during the livestream is around 15-20 households and more later in the day.

Parkwood continues to maintain a presence on Facebook. Posts to our Facebook page tend to be links to the livestreamed services. In addition to the webservant, our minister, Christian Education Support Worker and a member of the Outreach team can post to the page. In addition to our main Facebook page, Parkwood Youth have a presence on Facebook maintained by our CE Support Worker.

J. Finance Team

We continue to have several volunteers who look after the various aspects of the financial affairs of Parkwood. Betty Paul is the Envelope Secretary and maintains an accounting system for donations and income received. Dianne Nickerson prepares cheques to pay non-payroll invoices. Ugo Kejeh is the Treasurer, prepares the monthly payroll and posts all cheques to the SAGE accounting system. Kathy Newton prepares the bank reconciliation and financial statements and also makes various adjustments. Ugo then finalizes the standard monthly financial statement for use by each team and communication to the congregation by the Finance Team. Gord Walford processes the monthly e-transfers and provides general assistance to the financial system. The above group of volunteers provide many hours of volunteer assistance to maintain our financial system.

Loan Repayment Fund

History

As shown in Table LR1, the donation to the Loan Repayment Fund in 2023 was \$15,046 which was somewhat less than our target of \$17,000 for the year. As shown in Table LR1, the required loan repayment totalled \$17,454 in 2023. The repayment was greater than the donation by \$2,408 which lowered our reserve by this amount. The amount we require to pay on the loans in 2023 is \$16,706.

As of the end of 2023, the outstanding balance on the primary loan is \$38,562 and on the secondary loan is \$24,000. Relative to the original borrowing of \$130,000 the balance owing is now 47.7 per cent of the original loans.

Going Forward

As shown in Table LR2, the peak total repayment of the two loans was in 2023. The annual repayment declines gradually through 2027 and then drops sharply after the secondary loan is repaid.

The interest rate payable on the secondary loan is a function of average GIC rates over a specified period. The rise in interest rates in general and in the GIC rates in particular in 2023 caused the rate payable by Parkwood on the loan to increase from the estimated rates presented in the 2022 Annual Report.

The challenge for 2024 is to meet the required payment of \$16,706. The down-the-road challenge is to repay the primary loan by 2027 because that qualifies Parkwood to get a return of the roughly \$13,000 in interest payments made to that point.

Recommendation

The target for donations to the Loan Repayment Fund in 2024 is \$16,500.

B. Parkwood Audit Committee: Report for the year ended December 31, 2023

The Parkwood Audit Committee was appointed at the February 2023 annual congregational meeting. The team consists of Kathryn Newton, Stewart Elder and Brenda Featherstone.

In order to provide that the financial accounts of the congregation are "properly audited", the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada has set out in the <u>Book of Forms</u> Section 170 that *... a congregation may seek volunteers to provide an independent and diligent scrutiny of the records.* The committee's mandate is set out in this same section of the <u>Book of Forms</u>.

In November of 2023, Martha and John Fair were added to the audit committee as approved at the Session meeting in December 2023.

The committee began its review of the financial records during the fall of 2023 and will complete its review of the financial records in January and February 2024 with a report to be given at the February 2024 annual meeting.

A. Budget Team Report and Recommendations

Overview for 2023

The congregation provided total givings for all purposes of over \$280,000 in 2023. Givings for local purposes were up about \$4,000 while givings for funds and other current purposes were up \$9,000. The two significant anonymous donations during the year as well as the "surge" in givings in December are especially appreciated.

Rental income was nearly \$8,000 higher than in 2022 as the use of our building by other congregations and community groups increased. Some fundraising activities were initated in 2023 and they raised \$1,355.

Expenditures in 2023 were up over \$10,000 to \$226,000 while total receipts for local purposes were \$222,000. The deficit was about \$4,000. The actual deficit was significantly lower than originally expected as givings by the congregation were higher than the target, rental income rose by nearly \$8,000 and teams minimized their increase in expenditures to the extent possible.

There is much to be thankful for with the increase in givings by the congregation and the increased utilization of our building by other congregations and community groups.

Challenges for 2024

There will be some major financial challenges for the congregation in 2024.

- Expenses to operate the building are up and these are basically beyond our control.
- There is a recommendation to balance the budget for local purposes.
- There is our obligation to meet the repayment requirements for our two building loans.
- There is a need to continue to make our contributions for other goals such as the Benevolent Fund and the various missions such as Presbyterians Sharing.

Recommendation #1

The Budget team recommends that the congregation approve expenditures for Local Purposes of \$226,847 in 2024. (Line 19 in Table B1)

Recommendation #2

In order to balance the budget for 2024, the Budget team recommends that the congregation approve a target for offerings for Local Purposes of \$201,847. (Line 1 in Table B1)

Recommendation #3

Session recommends a congregational target of \$10,000 for combined financial donations to support Presbyterians Sharing and Presbyterian World Service and Development in 2024.

PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended December 31, 2023

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

These financial statements report on the activities of Parkwood Presbyterian Church, 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario. The Church was originally established in February 1965.

The Church operates exclusively as a not-for-profit organization and as such is exempt from income tax. The Church is a registered charity.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, except for the following:

The church building and furnishings are stated at estimated replacement value based on an insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016.

The land is stated at nominal value as the cost is not determinable.

These statements are prepared using the cash basis of accounting other than HST recoverable which is accrued at the time the expenditure to which it relates is incurred.

The following significant accounting principles have been used in preparation of these financial statements:

Revenue recognition:

Donations are recorded as revenue in the year in which they are received unless designated for a future period in which case they are deferred and taken into revenue in the period in which the related expenditure is made.

Investments – Restricted Fund

Short-term and long-term investments are interest bearing guaranteed investment certificates which are recorded at cost, which approximates the market value of the investments. As at December 31, 2023, a total of \$40,000 of the investments held are invested in 1-year cashable Guaranteed Investment Certificates with interest compounding to the maturity date or to the date the investment is cashed, whichever comes first. Interest earned on both long- and short-term investments is recorded on a cash basis when received.

Financial instruments:

The Church's financial instruments are comprised of cash on hand and in the bank, short-term financial instruments, HST recoverable, current and long-term liabilities. All financial instruments are reported at their fair values on the statement of financial position. The fair values are the same as the carrying values due to the nature of the financial instruments. Unless disclosed elsewhere in the notes to the financial statements, it is management's opinion that the Church is not exposed to significant interest rate, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments.

2. BUILDINGS AND FURNISHINGS

The Church building and furnishing are recorded at estimated replacement value at December 31, 2017, based on the most recent insurance valuation dated December 15, 2016. The value of the Building and Furnishings at this time was estimated at \$2,628,751. The cost of land at 10 Chesterton Drive is recorded at a nominal value of \$1.

3. SECURED LOAN PAYABLE:

Lending Fund Loan

In December 2015, the Church secured a loan of \$65,000 from the <u>Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada</u> (the Fund). The loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015.

In July 2016, the Church secured a further advance of \$35,000 from the Lending Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada which was also obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the Building, as approved at its Annual

Meeting on February 20, 2016. The Lending Fund loan is secured by a charge on the land and building at 10 Chesterton Drive, Ottawa, Ontario.

The Loan is interest free for the first 6 years, with 7% interest per annum on the outstanding balance thereafter from the 7th to the 15th year. Payments on the loan are to be made quarterly, based on a predetermined repayment schedule with interest amounts being added to the principal repayment amount beginning in the 7th year (2022). Extra payments on principal may be made at no cost, providing advance notice of the payment is provided. The total principal repayment due in the 12 months ending December 31, 2024, is \$7,167

Extension Fund Loan

In May 2016, the Church secured a loan of \$30,000 from the <u>Extension Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the</u> <u>Presbytery of Ottawa</u>. The Loan was obtained for the purpose of completing the expansion of the building at 10 Chesterton Drive, as approved by the congregation at its Annual Meeting on February 20, 2016.

The loan is unsecured and repayable in full, by May 9, 2027. There was no interest charged on or before May 9, 2022. As of May 1, 2023 interest is being charged on the outstanding balance at an annual rate of interest equal to the average GIC rate of interest available from the 5 largest Canadian chartered banks. Principal repayments of the loan are due as follows: \$6,000 due annually, on or before each of the following dates: May 9, 2023; May 9, 2024, May 9, 2025; May 9, 2026; and May 9, 2027.

The total principal repayment due in the 12 months ending December 31, 2024, is \$6,000.

4. INTERFUND TRANSFERS:

During the year ended December 31, 2023 the following transfers between funds were made:

- \$7,167 was transferred from the Loan Repayment Fund to the Operating Fund, for the purpose of principal repayments on the Secured Lending Fund Loan
- \$6,000 was transferred from the Loan Repayment Fund to the Operating Fund, for the purpose of principal repayments on the Extension Fund Loan
- \$5,000 was transferred from the Planned Giving Fund to the external Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund account currently held at BMO to be invested in accordance with the terms of reference passed by Session on June 25, 2018.
- \$7,312 was transferred from the Mitchell-Hempstock Interest Fund to the Operating Fund based on direction from Session.
- \$7,672 was transferred from the Unallocated Interest Fund to the Operating Fund based on direction from Session.

5. ENDOWMENT/PLANNED GIVING MINISTRY FUND:

The Endowment /Planned Giving Ministry Fund is restricted and accounts for donations received where the donor requested that the principal be maintained by the Church on a permanent basis, or for a specified fixed term, with the interest earned by the invested principal to be allocated for a specific purpose approved by Session.

6. ROOF REPAIR UNDER INSURANCE:

Storm damage to the church building roof was repaired in 2022 using insurance proceeds. The net cost of the repairs was \$57,056.78. Insurance proceeds were \$55,056.78 resulting in a net cost to the Church of \$2,500.00

7. INTERNAL BORROWING:

At the Annual Meeting on February 21, 2015, a motion was approved by the congregation to borrow internally from the Organ Replacement Fund for purposes of funding the proposed building construction project. The total transfer from the Organ Replacement Fund to the Building Replacement Fund during the year ended December 31, 2016, was \$15,000. This internal loan was made on an interest-free basis with no fixed terms of repayment.
